

Suggest Old Courthouse As Magistrate's Office

Proposed uses of both the new and the old Halton County Court House and administration building were reviewed briefly at the November meeting of Halton County Council.

Magistrate K. M. Langdon submitted a plan to use the present building on Brown St. Milton, for the entire county's Magistrate's Court and offices, thus centralizing the facilities in Milton. The building committee recommended no immediate action on the request until further information is available.

New Registry Office

The committee reported discussing the services which should be accommodated in the new building, slated for erection on a site on the Bay Lane northeast of Milton, and asked that the Registry Office be moved to this new building. Included in their plan is the moving of the County Health Unit from a converted house into the former Registry Office building.

The Milton Public Library Board requested accommodation in the present Court House when the new building is completed. The request will be considered later.

Good Exercise

Burlington Reeve J. L. Giveman, noting a committee report that a proposal for ambulance service on a county basis has been turned down, wondered why the Civil Defence group could not take this over as a project. "I can't think of any better exercise than carrying bodies off the Queen Elizabeth Way," he explained, and added that council could take advantage of Provincial grants if it was a C.D. scheme.

The proposal was referred to the committee.

Artificial Port

Our tour of the beaches started at Arramanches, where a permanent museum perpetuates the success of "Operation Mulberry" — the artificial port which was used to serve our invading forces until Antwerp was cleared in November. Six of us, the only English-speaking members of our particular tour, were given special treatment by the staff. We had a special showing of the Diorama (the invasion in 3D) and a film on the building of the port, in English.

On Display

Uniforms and badges of all the invasion troops are on display, with weapons and ammunition, and photographs of D-Day on the beaches. Needless to say, the youngsters "steal" the displays of weapons and ammunition and grenades. And they had a wonderful time of it, making believe among the huge redoubt castles that still remain on the sands at low tide, grim reminders of the urgency of that port which was to prove the undoing of the German Army of the West.

Swarmed Ashore

We toured each of the beaches — Bernieres sur mer, Courseulles sur mer, and St. Aubin sur mer, where the Canadians swarmed ashore on June 6th, 1944. At each of these beaches the French have placed monuments in grateful memory of their liberation. Even today, with the beaches lined with "cabanas" of holiday makers, one can distinguish landmarks glimpsed in those first mad days.

Peaceful

Turning inland we crossed through many of the little country roads where every hedge and wall was an obstacle. Today the scene was a peaceful one, with farmers and their families harvesting the wheat from fields which were overrun a scant 16 years ago.

Village

We paused awhile at the beautifully kept cemeteries at Bayeux and Bern-sur-Mer (divisions where the 225th Canadian Infantry, soldiers and air men, were killed and are buried in the villages of Fontaine Henri, Basti, Colombi-sur-Thaon, Anguery, Bouanville, Villons-les-Buissons, Cambes St. Contest — and many others etched so very deeply in Canada's war record as her men held on the "hinge" of Caen.

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BY-LAW No. 60-17
TOWN OF GEORGETOWN

A By-law to provide for the submitting of a question to the Electors of the Town of Georgetown at the next ensuing annual election.

Whereas the Municipal Council may make application to the Ontario Municipal Board for the division of the Municipality into wards;

And Whereas the Municipal Council has deemed it advisable to obtain the opinion of the electors according to the last revised voters' list at the next ensuing annual election on the question of the Council making application for the division of the Municipality into wards;

Now, therefore the Municipal Council of the Town of Georgetown enacts as follows:

1. That a vote of the Electors qualified to vote according to the last revised voters' list of the Town of Georgetown shall be taken at the same time and at the same place as the next ensuing annual municipal election for the members of the Municipal Council and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold elections shall take the vote on the following question:

"Are you in favour of the Municipal Council making application for the division of the Municipality into wards?"

2. On the 5th day of December, 1960, at the hour of 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon the Mayor or some member of the Council appointed for that purpose by resolution shall attend at the Municipal Chambers for the purpose of appointing and, if requested to do so, shall appoint by writing, signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the vote in the affirmative on the question and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the vote in the negative on the question.

3. On the 5th day of December, 1960, at the hour of 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon at the Municipal Chambers in the Town of Georgetown, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given in the affirmative on the question and in the negative on the question.

By-law read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 13th day of June, 1960.

CAEN, Normandy. This week we rolled back 15 years. Leaving Paris after an all too brief holiday, we headed for Caen and the invasion coast.

Tour Battlefields

At Caen we looked up Lod and Toursme where we received information we had been promised for our tour of the battlefields. The post little see-see parents inlay only add to hotel accommodation and got into our Envoys with us and guided us to the hotel that was to be our headquarters for the next four days.

Heaps of Rubble

We could scarcely believe our eyes as we drove into the centre of Caen. On our last visit we followed armored bulldozers

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
