Would Set 10 Acres Subdivision Minimum

Esqueuing council has recommended to the township planning board that there be no further separations of land of less than ten acres for residential purposes.

The recommendation, moved by Walter Linham and seconded by Wilfred Leslie, was passed at an Esqueuing Council meeting of the 14th with the following conditions excepted:

1. One separation per calendar year from each 100 acres to a total of four separations per 100 acre lot.
2. In cases where it is a family transaction from father to son or daughter.
3. Where the separation is for industrial or commercial purposes, in which cases there is no restriction.
4. In all cases the owner of a property being divided must agree to make a payment of \$300.00 toward a Capital Reserve Fund, before approval is granted. Such payments to be kept in a Special Account and used only for Capital purposes.
5. That in the case of properties under ten acres the present restriction of one separation every five (5) years be continued. With a total of two separations allowed.

Burlington Man Named to Canadian Hall of Fame

A well known Halton resident was named recently to the Canadian Hall of Fame by the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

M. M. Robinson, Burlington, originator of the British Empire Games in 1930, was one of three executives across Canada chosen for the honor at the annual AAA meeting in Halifax last week.

Mr. Robinson received the award for his "long standing contribution to amateur sports and outstanding leadership in connection with the British Empire Games." said Miss Margaret Lord, of Burlington, secretary of the AAA, and delegate from the southwestern Ontario branch at the meeting.

She said Mr. Robinson would receive the scroll officially in the near future and his picture would be hung with others in the special amateur athletic section of the hockey Hall of Fame at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Mr. Robinson, who works in Toronto with the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association, organized and managed the first British Empire Games in Hamilton. He was manager of the Canadian British Empire Game team in London in 1934 and of the British Empire team in Australia in 1938.

In addition, he was manager of the Canadian track team to the Olympic games held in Amsterdam in 1928, of the Canadian Olympic team in 1932 in Los Angeles, and he was founder of the Hamilton Olympic Club.

Mr. Robinson was also secretary of both the British Empire Games committee and the Canadian Olympic committee for about 10 years.

The award was announced in Halifax by Maj. J. D. Davies, of Montreal, chairman of the Hall of Fame committee and president of the British Empire and Commonwealth Games of Canada.
