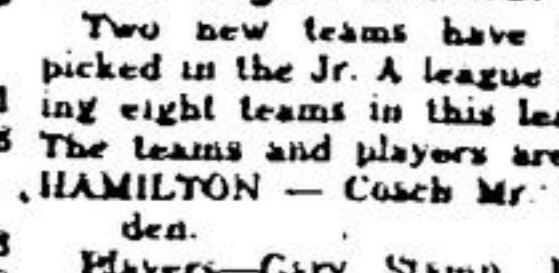

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# SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

Reports from local hunters about their hunting trips this fall for deer and moose are beginning to arrive, and from these reports it is indicated that local hunters are finding it a little harder to bag one of these elusive animals.

Although sightings of deer by local hunters before and during the hunting season have been quite numerous, the tight-bag of these deer down the barrel of the hunter's gun are not.

And again this year stories of the deer and moose hunters having better luck hunting the hunter, are again giving the stories of successful deer hunting a run for the leadership in the obituary columns of many of the Province's papers.

Carman Copland and Walter Thompson from town hunting with Frank Celis from Alliston, Alex Embing and Norval Agnew from Brampton, Elmer and John Paterson from Palgrave, Dave and Eli Henderson from Bolton and Tom Coulter, from Schomberg, hunting at the Toronto Maple Leaf Club at Uxton which is on Hwy. 516 north of Bracebridge. Two deer were bagged by the party, a spike horn weighing 160 lbs and a 4 pointed buck weighing approximately 200 pounds.

Dale Marshall from town, hunting with his brother Fred and five others, hunting in the Alton area, bagged a deer, and although more were sighted. As this area is quite swampy, and hunters cannot use dogs, they were unable to bag any more, without taking the chance of leaving a wounded deer in the middle of one of the larger swamps.

Howard Graff, sales manager of Proce Motors, here in Georgetown, who introduced Ernie Hoffmann, to Hoffmann Construction, also of town, to deer hunting, reports no deer were bagged, but one hunter was shot in the leg while sitting on a horse; the same bullet that pierced the hunter's leg, also entered the horse's stomach and this same hunter, even while he yelled his head off, had 2 or 3 more shots fired at him before the shooting stopped.

Congratulations are in order for Ted Hayes of 106 Ravlawn, not for killing a deer or a moose, but for being named Fisherman of the Year at the Inseton Sportsmen's Club. With this award, Ted receives a trophy and a plaque and \$75 in fishing tackle. Ted was also named man of the year and for this receives a trophy.

Congratulations also to the Inseton Sportsmen's Club for their help in building better sportsmen such as Ted. With clubs such as this, and men like Ted, Canada's Fish, Wildlife and Fur acts will continue to be one of our finest national resources.

Dale Marshall's brother Fred, who is the game warden, at South Simcoe and other game wardens have another job on their hands, in watching for hunters who are using .22 rifles when they are against the law.

As Sol Carter of the Junction Sports Centre was demonstrating to me how easy it is to insert the new 22 bullet firing insert for 12 gauge shotguns. This insert is 10 to 11 inches long and is accurate up to 100 yards and can be used in a double or a single barrel shotgun.

So now along with watching for poachers, taking water temperatures and tree samples, game wardens in certain areas will have to start looking down the barrels of shotguns.
