

# Near Full-House Crowd As Raiders Get Revenge

Reverse Score, Beat Milton by 7 Goals

The Georgetown Raiders football club introduced its new coach, Don Hunter (No. 2) and Don McDonald (No. 9) to their supporters at Milton on Friday night and simultaneously on Friday night the two teams were as far apart as Tonto's knees.

The cool rain continued with new coach Nat Auger who saw his team defeat against Milton in their first clash, and George (Never Back Up) Gray comprised one of the toughest defensive walls the county soon merchants have ever been dashed against and backed up goals. Terry Moore and backed up goals while Raiders went up a scoring spree to tumble Milton 100 and even their wounded records.

The game was the second of the young Intermediate A season won for both clubs. Milton won the first one 105 on their home ice the previous Tuesday. Offensively the Blue Jays, Junior Beaumont, Ron Dixon and Bill McDonald did the major part of the bombing. Both scored in three and Beaumont and Dixon each scored a pair as the Raiders exploded for 9 of them in the second period.

Bruce McAdden opened the scoring for Milton at 5:18 of the first period and the lead stood until the 41:20 mark when Wayne Thompson took a pass from Auger and backhanded it by Bill Orr.

Just 27 seconds had gone by in the middle frame when the Raiders started their barrage. Dixon scored that one from less

about 15 feet out and it was followed up at 1:10 by Blake Inglis' first goal. Nat Auger less than a minute later made it 3-0 as Nick Ferri's crew started to fall off the pace.

Thompson notched his second goal at 3:50, Beaumont twice, at 6:11 and 13:01, and then Inglis again at 13:14. Raiders' 5th and 10th tallies were scored in the twentieth minute; Blake Inglis at 19:23 and Ron Dixon just 8 seconds before the latter. The period ended 10 to 2.

Art Melanson steered in a Jack Price pass at 2:51 of the final frame but any hint of a rally died there.

The unluckiest Merchant of the night was Jack Price who with 14 Raiders to choose from picked Nat Auger for a fight in the third period, and he couldn't have made a worse choice. Auger is a former boxer and was well ahead on points when referee Bruno Irwin finally hauled him off his feet.

The period ended 10 to 2.

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## SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

Reports from local hunters about their hunting trips this fall for deer and moose are beginning to arrive, and from these reports it is indicated that local hunters are finding it a little harder to bag one of these elusive animals.

Although sightings of deer by local hunters before and during the hunting season have been quite numerous, the sightings of these deer down the barrel of the hunter's gun are not.

According to these stories, the deer and moose hunters having better luck than the hunters, and success giving the stories of successful deer hunts a run for the leadership in the obituary columns of many of the Province's papers.

Carmen Copland and Walter Thompson from town hunting with Frank Colis from Milton, Alex Embing and Norval Agnew from Brampton, Elmer and John Paterson from Palgrave, Dave and Eli Henderson from Bolton and Tom Coulter from Schomberg, hunting at the Twin Maple Hunt Club at Uxton which is on Hwy. 516 north of Bracebridge. Two deer were bagged by the party, a spike horn weighing 160 lbs and a 4 pointed buck weighing approximately 200 pounds.

Congratulations are in order for Ted Hayes of 106 Bayview, not for killing a deer or a moose, but for being named Fisherman of the Year at the Lexington Sportsmen's Club. So now along with watching for poachers, taking water temperatures and tree samples, game wardens in certain areas will have to start looking down the barrels of shotguns.
