Program of Nature Preservation Discussed

A fresh appraisal of Ontario's policy on nature preservation particularly the problem of animal control in provincial parks, was advocated by Dr. C. H.D. Clarke, assistant chief, division of fish and wild life, of the Dept. of Lands and Forests.

Dr. Clarke spoke as a member of a panel dealing with controversial problems in provincial parks during the seminar on parks and nature reserves in Ontario. A two day seminar was sponsored jointly by Citise Service Oil Co. Ltd. and the Conservation Council of Ontario.

He decried animal control as one of the most complicated problems to face park administrators. He also pointed out that a "much more modern assessment of the purpose of provincial parks than that set forth by the Commission on Forest Preservation and National Park in 1944, was necessary. "If any intelligent comment is to be made on areas animal populations it has to be based on a more up-to-date expression," Dr. Clarke noted.

He said it was necessary to determine whether provincial parks are forest management areas primarily or places for public recreation.

In his address, Dr. Clarke referred to present deer populations as a great management problem. He said that the deer population is made difficult by large numbers of deer which destroy tree crops. However, in noting the destruction of wolves by man, which he described as being "quite unnecessary from any point of view," he wondered if "we are now to pass judgment on the deer."

"If deer were able to increase unchecked they would ultimately reach a stage where they would starve in critical seasons simply because of the destruction of their food supply," he said. There has never been any suggestion that bears have attained an excessive population in Algonquin Park, and the same applied to beaver, he said.

"I think we may have made a mistake in some areas in the past in trying to establish a principle of complete non-interference with nature," Dr. Clarke stated. He noted that even in the Arctic region, certain types of migrant shorebirds are scarce because of conditions prevailing several thousand miles away.

"We should not encourage man in the dangerous view that he can take a chunk of nature and isolate it in a watertight compartment," he warned, adding that man was an integral part of nature and "the sooner he realizes it the better."
