Ottawa, Edmonton Vie For Grey Cup Saturday

Ottawa Rough Riders, making their ninth Grey Cup appearance, and Edmonton Eskimos, appearing for the seventh occasion, will be national championship opponents for the first time when they clash at Vancouver next Saturday, November 28.

East Ahead
This year will mark the 34th meeting between Eastern and Western champions for the \$50,000 silver trophy for which Canadian professional teams now spend at least \$500,000 a season to win. So far the East has won 25 times, the West eight, since the inter-sectional challenge was inaugurated in 1921 in six years 1924, 28, 29, 36, 40, 44, the West did not challenge.
