WHAT COUNCIL DID

Set Election Information Centre at Delrex Plaza

Members of Delrex Ratepayers association are planning an information centre on election night in Delrex Market Centre. Appearing for the association, James Brown, who is a council candidate, asked council Monday for permission to use one of the places in the Municipal Office to transmit election returns for posting at headquarters. Council was reluctant to promise exclusive use of a phone for one group of citizens, but offered to allow the association to install a phone of their own for the night. This will probably be done, according to Mr. Brown, who said he would take the proposition back to the association.  
Three years ago, the town allowed a temporary building permit for a storage building at the rear of the 164 store, with the proviso that removal could be asked if and when a service road is planned. The property owner, C. C. Downey, has now requested that the town waive the agreement. Council's planning committee was asked to study the proposal.  
Another property request, this from Win. B. Ackerman who owns part of the old lower papermill property, was that the town pay expenses of a survey and he would deed a road allowance. Council replied that they are not interested at the present time.  
Representatives of councils, industrial commissions, Chamber of Commerce and other such groups will be attending a round table industrial conference here on Friday, December 2nd, reported Cr. John Elliott. The forum will be conducted by A. H. LeMaunier of the Dept. of Planning and Development and is designed to cover the whole of Halton County.  
A new street light at the Highway - John St. corner will result from a police traffic patrol for Friday's hockey game. It was found that lighting is not bright enough when crowds are crossing and the hydro will be asked for an extra light.  
Cr. Win. E. Hunter expressed thanks to the police for the fine job done.

Herrington, McPhail are Royal Poultry Winners

One of the oldest showmen in the poultry division of the Royal Winter Fair, Corey E. Herrington took his Sunset Farm birds to the big show last week and came home with a good share of the prizes. Mr. Herrington, who publishes Feather Fancier, a monthly newspaper for poultry fanciers, is also one of the continent's most noted judges. He has been continuously in the Royal since 1923, as an exhibitor, a judge or both.  
This year he took prizes for best collection in buff leghorns, SC mottled game, silver spangled hamper, black hamper, silver polish, SC black minnator.  
In both categories he had 1st and 2nd (1st and 2nd hen, 1st and 2nd cocker) and 1st pullet. He also had best collection, champion orpington champion English and runner up for champion bird in show.  
In both cases, all his entries were in the win columns and he took best collection. He took all 1st in both faced pulch, best collection, champion Polish and runner up to champion bird.  
Bantam entries were equally profitable for Sunset Farm. He had 1st collection, SC white leghorns and black cocks. The latter a keenly contested class, best collection of silver spangled hamper, and took several prizes in milky blue, modern brown red game and O.E. spangle games. He showed a total of 101 bantams.  
Another district showman, James McPhail, B. B. 2, took several prizes in game bantams and partridge wyandotte bantams.
