WHY COUNCIL DID
Services which must be installed by future subdividers in Georgetown are outlined in a by-law which received its required three readings Monday by the town council.

In future, new subdividers must provide roads including sealing, grading and chipping. Sanitary and storm sewers are also requirements, as are water mains, street signs and curbs and gutters.

The lengthy by-law over a hundred typewritten pages long has been in preparation for some time and contains detail of specifications of security which must be posted by subdividers for assurance that copies of the by-law will be made available for study by subdividers with a deposit required for return of the by-law.
