

Five Candidates for Esquusing School Board

Five candidates are running for School Trustee seats in Esquusing School Area No. 1. They are William Pomeroy, Art Roy, Mrs. Shirley Armstrong, Stanley J. Brown and Stanley Brown. Another nominee, George Fisher, is not a candidate.

School Board Chairman Clarence Cole at Monday's public meeting, thanked the candidates for their cooperation especially in keeping the roads ploughed to efficiently in winter.

"Esquusing teachers' salaries average \$3000 a year," he said, "and our teachers are among the best."

With four school buses running the transportation cost is \$1150 a day. Mr. Cole informed the group he expressed pride in the low cost of administration, 34% of the total budget.

He commended the members of the School Board for their hard work throughout a difficult year.

R. J. Cunningham, a member of the School Board, paid tribute to retiring School Board member Roy G. L. Royal. He felt his going would be a great loss to the Board, since Mr. Royal had given out many to be played.

Mr. Wm. Pomeroy spoke very briefly, saying he could only promise to do the job to the best of his ability.

Mrs. Shirley Armstrong felt that as a mother of three children she was naturally interested in education, interested enough to attend most of the School Board meetings.

She outlined her background, citing experience in legal and insurance offices, and concluded by saying she was a serious practical candidate.

Art Roy, at present a member of the Board, remarked humorously, that the chairman had said all there was to say but hoped for the ratepayers' support again this year.

"Rural children should have the same chance as town children," contended William Korzack, "that's why I favour central schools."

He felt money spent on teachers' salaries was a wise investment concluding with "you only get what you pay for."

Stanley Brown felt the members of the School Board should come from different parts of the Area. At the moment he feels they are all together in one spot.

"Having four years experience on the Board, I think I know the difficulties," he stated.

He concluded by urging the ratepayers to give serious consideration to the casting of their ballots, since those elected handle a lot of money.
