Business Club Shocked Hospital Pledge Arrears

Mrs. Earl Hornby presided at the regular monthly dinner meeting of the Business and Professional Women's Club at the Jack O'Leary on Monday evening. Three guests attended who are going to become members. They were Miss Lillian Wolf, Mrs. Doris Sprack and Mrs. Perry Tunlick.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and the business transacted out of them was discussed. The December meeting had been moved ahead to December 12th in view of the fact that the regular date would be on Boxing Day, however after the setting of the date the members were asked to again help with the Senior Citizens dinner on the same date, so it was decided that those sixteen who would serve at the dinner and the other members would meet at 9 o'clock at the club on the 12th for the members for a short business session. The place will be decided later and members will be advised.

Miss Jean Mackenzie agreed to chair a committee to study the U.N.C.L.U. Halloween shellings and what the members were to do. One appalling fact that came to light was that approximately 250 patients are in arrears. In view of the fact that a great part of the hospital is being built on a plot of 100 acres, it is a frightening figure. Encouraging facts were that the hospital building contractors are right up to schedule and subject to no major mishaps it will be ready and waiting for patients the first part of June 1961. At this moment 90% of the interior door frames are complete, 30% of the interior partitions and all floors are in with the exception of the terrazzo. A staggering statistic was that they have been 242,773 bricks laid so far in the construction.

The X-ray machines, laundry equipment and operating room lights have been ordered. In view of the fact that pledges are down, the club decided to pay their yearly pledge early.
