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## Coach Lee Sparks Team To Fourth Straight Win

Win 7-5 Overtime  
Tilt With Oaks

The most concrete argument a hockey coach can produce to support his methods is a glowing record.

That's what Elmer Lee has. And that's probably why Georgetown hockey fans have expressed no more surprise than the occasional raised eyebrow when Coach Lee took a forward line which includes two regular defencemen or throws a pair of indifferent checkers over the boards to kill off a penalty.

What ever combination he comes up with invariably succeeds.

The secret? Probably Elmer Lee himself.

A fiery type coach with short fuse temper, Lee has the ability to instill in his players the desire to extend themselves to a rare quality.

That extra desire can make the difference between a win and a loss.

It did last Wednesday night in Oakville when the Redford lineup looked shaky with the absence of Blake Inglis, Doug Richardson and Jamie Cunningham. But despite their weakened condition the Georgetown club outskated and outguffed their southern brothers and at the end of a ten minute overtime, emerged with 7 to 5 win, their 4th straight.

Lee's incessant chatter paced his team out of a hot start early in the game when Oakville scored three times and led 3-0 before the first period was half over. It was 3-2 at the end of the frame and Redford even overtook the Oaks to lead 4-3 at one point but soon rendered the margin and after two periods trailed 5-4.

Georgetown scored the only third period goal. The winner and the insurance goal were both in the Oakville net before the three minute mark of the ten minute overtime.

Bob Bishop from Hawkin at the 51 second mark, Ford from R. Steven at 1:43 and Dawson from Hawkin at 1:59 beat Rhodes before the tide started to turn. Bob Demerse broke

the Redford into the scoring from lower Duns and Tinto Beaumont at 16:37 and Joe Auger scored on a pass from Bill Clark at 19:04 to chop the lead to a single goal.

Wesley Thompson triggered the comeback after taking a pass from Demerse at 5:50 of the overtime period but it wasn't until the 14:16 mark that Dave Irons put Georgetown ahead. Goals by Inglis and Demerse closed the game.

Goals by Dawson from Dryden at 15:37 and Baker from Dawson at 17:25 changed the picture in a hurry. Irons who was packed by the Oakville Record Star as the game's star, scored his second at 6:25 of the third from Demerse, an important one which forced the extra period.

The hero's role was played by Junior Beaumont who banged in a goal mouth pass from Tom Dixon at 1:39 of the overtime and it was on an almost identical play that Auger scored it up about a minute later.

This time with Thompson making the play. Alert forecheck by the frustrated Oakvilles, at 1:43 and 1:59, showed how hard they were working.

Georg's Inglis, shadowing bar raised Oakville had his Bob Bishop into another display of temper. Bishops hot head got him into trouble in an earlier game against Bradford and Wednesday night's exhibition cost him a match misconduct.

### SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

Unless you are a diehard fisherman you can get your reels, wigs, and park them away until next spring. But if you are a diehard fisherman there are still a few fish in season in the Northern and North-western parts of Ontario. Bass, Pike, Pickerel and Muskogee are a few that are still in season around the St. Clair river, and lake and the Niagara River in certain areas.

Pike (Great Northern or Grass Pike) have no closed season when taken by angling in most areas, but you should check your fishing regulations for the area you intend to fish.

Now that you may be thinking about your first ice fishing trip, you should again check your fishing regulations, referring to the area and time of your trip as Lake trout and Whitefish seasons are closed from two to four weeks in some areas.

Since yours truly began to write this column some three months ago I have received quite a number of hints from local sportsmen, that might improve your hunting or fishing. To these sportsmen I would like to say, "Thank you very much." And if anyone else has any news, hints, or recipes or something you think might improve or make more interesting this column, I would like to hear from you, by writing to "Sportsmen Outdoors," 40 Baylawn Cres., Georgetown, The Georgetown Herald, or phone TR. 7-4857.

Here are some of these hints I have received:

**Smell-Proof Nets:** Freshwater landing nets, as well as salt-water, acquire an unpleasant odour after a few fishing trips. To avoid this as well as help preserve your net, get a pressure can of waterproofing liquid and spray your nets well before each trip.

**One way to stop a fish . . .**

A fish cannot feel a hook; he runs to escape the restraint of the rod. When one is too heavy for your line, you can usually stop him before he empties your reel by letting him run with no drag. Then catch up to him and repeat until he's "run out." This must be done with great care, as the instant the line is tight, your fish will no doubt begin to run again, also keep your rod tip high.

**Pitch Catches:** In the woods you often see rotted stumps of long dead pines. Kick one apart and you'll find a cache of pitch—a sure campfire starter.

**Spincasting light lures**—Have you ever tried casting a fly or light lure with a spinning rod and found when you use a split shot it causes the light bait to lag behind, and foul the line? If you use two split-shot a foot apart it will prevent this.
