Thirty Years' History Cemetery Board Report

One and three quarter acres of lands has been annexed to the Georgetown Cemetery it was disclosed in a report read to the Report to the Year Meeting in Wrigglesworth Auditorium last week.

The report, read by Mrs. Floria Nodwell, a member of the original board, said the new land adjoining the old cemetery has been seeded, staked and will soon be ready for the sale of plots. Mrs. Nodwell said the board had already spent over \$1,700 on surveys and plans on the new development. The plans are subject to the approval of the Ontario Department of Health.

Last year the cemetery was enclosed with frost fence at a cost of \$5,000.

The report contained the history of the present board. In 1930 the Local Council of Women became interested in the cemetery and collected \$1,300 to make a start on a cleanup program. They approached the town council with the idea of putting the cemetery on a perpetual care basis and as a result the board held its first meeting early in 1935 with the following members: President, Mr. Ed McWhirter, secretary, Miss Annie Ryan, treasurer, Mr. E. W. Cole, and members Mr. Martin Near, Mr. Walter Anshous and Mrs. Clara Nodwell.

Through the following years Mr. David Crockett, Mr. H. L. Hut, Mr. W. F. Bradley and Mr. E. V. MacCormack served prominently on the board and Mr. Bradley donated most of the shrubs and ornamental trees which had been donated, other trees and shrubs.

In 1951 the Women's Institute erected the present stone walls and entrance gates which also added greatly to the appearance of the cemetery.

The present board, Mr. Harry Savings, secretary, treasurer,

Chief Bob Bonfield, overhauled stove pipes caused the blaze which was beyond control when firemen arrived. The house burned to the ground.

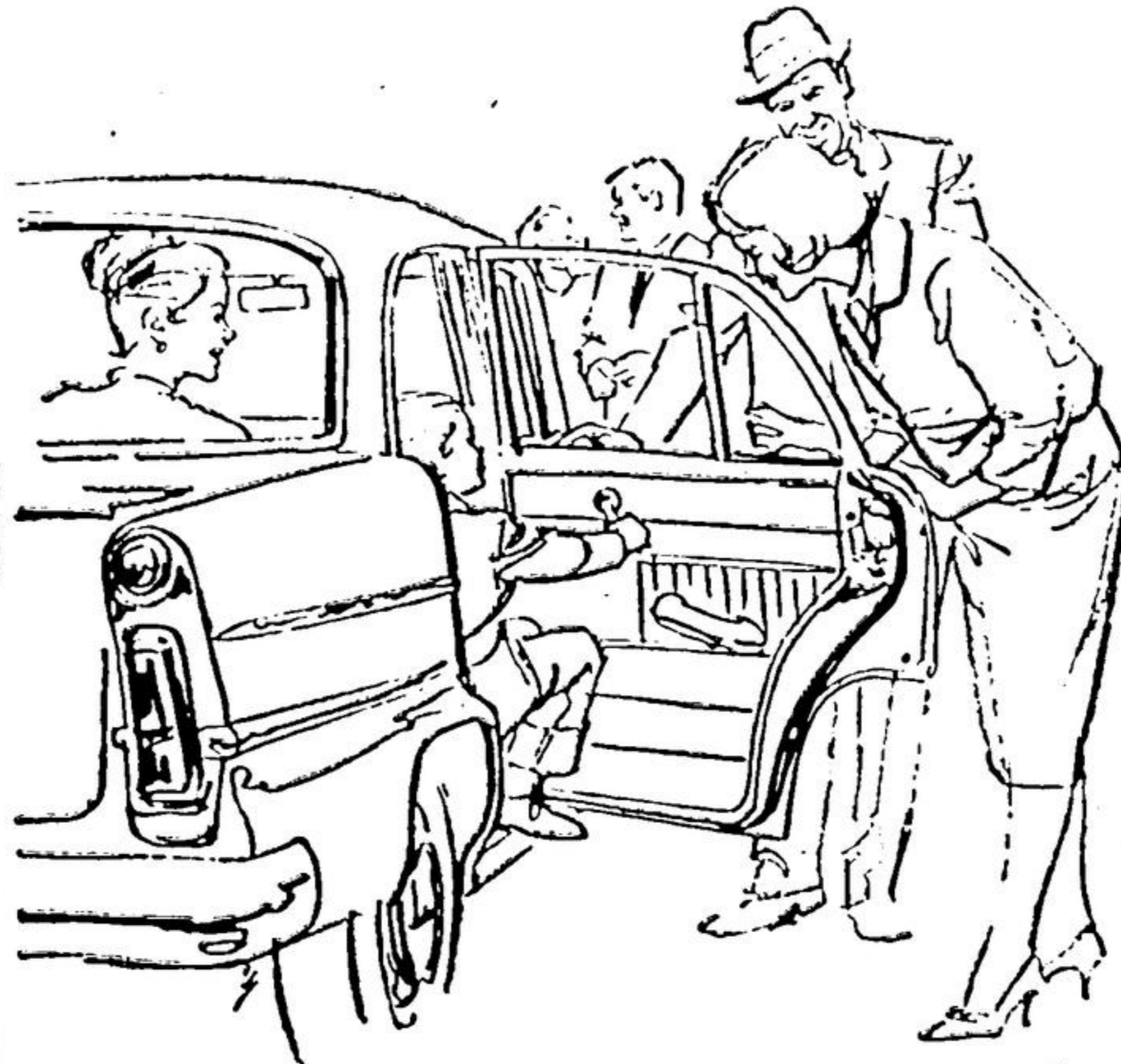
