GHS basketball coach Lynn McLaren will have the job of plying his squad down to 12 players by December 21st when the district basketball series gets under way with Milton offering the first competition.

Preparing for their second year in organized basketball competition, the GHS coaches have had only one practice as coach McLaren has chosen the exhibition trail to get his "cup" for the games that count.

Georgetown high has lost all three exhibition games so far against more experienced competition in Brampton and Orangeville as expected, but concerning the coaching staff more than the outcome is the margin between the winning team and the GHS aggregation and to date it certainly has not presented any reason for gloom.

In Orangeville last Thursday Georgetown high mixed by 20 points, 34 to 23, but in Brampton Monday night against the Brampton squad there was only a ten point spread as they lost 32-22. The team's improvement was evident here Tuesday night when they lost the return match with Orangeville 52 to 38.

Though probably the greenest team in the district the GHSers show more and more promise each time out and under Lynn McLaren's guidance the boys with natural scoring ability are starting to show. Prominent in the early test games have been Bob Bingham, Frank Kruster, Cowherough, in a scoring way, while above par performances have also come from Harry McClurg, Gary Teeter, and Ray Norris. The current personnel numbers fifteen.

Favoured to repeat their march to the title last year are the Acton High School eagles who have in past seasons enjoyed the decided benefit of a YMCA, which is available for that extra practice. However, since the construction of the GHS gym the locals are rapidly making up ground and this could be the year of serious Georgetown contention.
