

## Subdivision Control By-law

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Mr. Zuber made a strong plea for another chance to sit down with a planning committee before legislation was considered. He said similar problems in Guelph and Brantford had been worked out and they are now forging ahead.

"I think 60-40 may be an ideal ratio, but to say so until then is making too much of it. It is possible for me to put up \$3,000 for every house I build," he said.

Mayor Hyde said council had been working on the by-law for seven months, that it affects everyone and that if it were going to be delayed for further discussions with builders, council would have to offer tax payers the same privileges, as it is a matter affecting everyone.

"You will have a chance at any time to suggest amendments. Meanwhile we can't stall legislation after all this work," he ended.

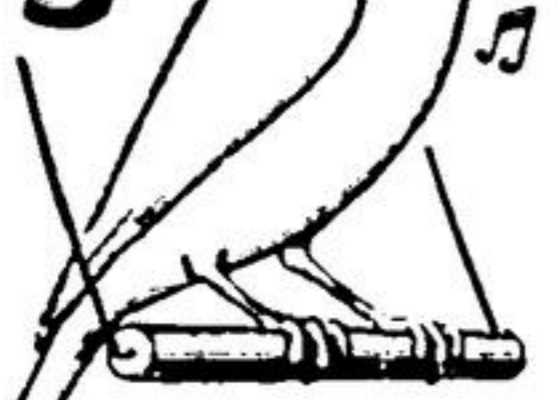

## Robert Lane Gets Snow Plow Contract

Snow plowing in town this winter will be handled by Robert Lane.

One of three local firms asked to submit tenders for the job, his price of \$7.25 an hour and \$50 a month standby time was lowest.

Tenders for major repairs to the town truck had also been asked last week, so council could decide whether to use the truck for snow plowing or engage an outside contractor.

At Monday's council meeting, council decided that the town truck could be better used for sanding, and with urgency of an overhaul of the truck removed, tenders were not opened. They will be handed over to the 1961 property chairman for later decision.

Presentation of a by-law which would close an unopened portion of Keats Ave was delayed again until council could study objections from Andrew Miller whose property adjoins the road. Mr. Miller was joined Monday by A. R. Webster who owns the property on the other side in saying that closing the street would affect their plans for building garages at the rear of their homes.

## Harry Purkins Was Two-War Veteran

A veteran of two wars, Harry Purkins, 64, died in Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto on November 30th. He had been seriously ill for several months.

Mr. Purkins, who lived at 54 Market St., had been caretaker at the public library until his illness.

Born in London, England, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Purkins. He enlisted as a boy in the Royal Marines, prior to World War I, and was in service until 1926. Four years later he came to Canada, lived in the west for a while, then at Sudbury, where he was employed in the mines.

He re-enlisted in the army in 1941, served overseas with the army service corps, and was
