

Sunday Graphic Closing Down

Herald owner Roy Thomson who has just added to his string of national newspapers in the

The Sunday Graphic, a tabloid with a circulation of more than 900,000 must close before the end of January, Mr. Thomson said. He acquired the paper last year when he purchased the British Kemble newspaper group.

WHAY COUNCIL DID

Town Seeks Winter Subsidy for Highway Survey, Park Seating

A winter works program which could save the town over \$3,000 while aiding men who might be unemployed during the winter months, was proposed by Mayor Hyde and accepted by council on Monday.

The program must first be approved by senior governments, then would have to be adopted by the 1961 council before all or any part of it were implemented.

The government will pay 75% of labour costs on any approved program, 25% more than the normal subsidy for a town.

The current program would include:

1. A complete survey of Highway 7 from east to west town limits. Town share \$1000 of an estimated \$4000 labour cost.
2. Clearing brush west of Princess Ann Drive. Town cost \$400 of total \$1600.
3. Additional seating at the park by construction of portable benches to increase seating capacity by 1200. Town cost \$350 labour.

Repairs to the screen at No. 1 water well. Town cost \$1500 of \$6000 labour.

The mayor is hopeful that if the park project is tackled, assistance might come from a number of service clubs.

Proposal to clear brush on Princess Ann drew opposition from Cr. Fred Harrison, who said he favours a ditch and stripping trees along the edge of the road, but does not want to see all the land cleared.

Mayor Sargent expressed agreement with him.

They were reminded by the mayor that next year's council will be the guiding factor in any plan, and that at present council is only seeking government sanction for any work that might be done.

An earlier inaugural meeting was forecast when the mayor said it would be necessary to make fast plans after the new year if the work were to be done during the stipulated period when winter works already is available.
