ONTARIO POLICY-HOLDERS**

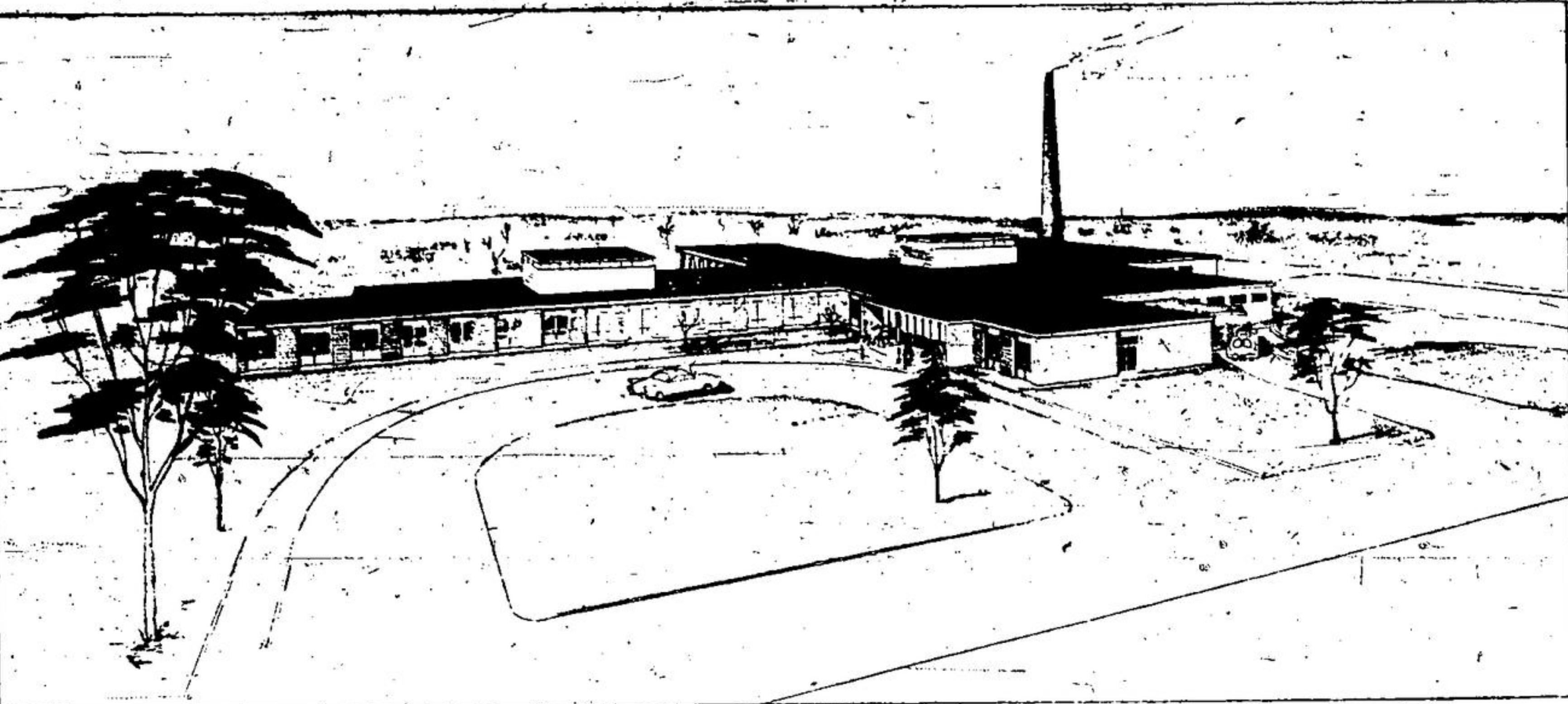

**Former Resident Makes  
Generous Hospital Gift**

Georgetown's Hospital became \$3,000 richer last week through the generosity of a former citizen.

Mr. A. Tony Restivo, who was the first owner and operator of Caruso's Fruit Market, donated that sum toward the Georgetown and District Hospital. Mr. Restivo had not been solicited, but made the gift without being approached.

With his brother in law active in the Hospital campaign and a director of the Hospital Board, he was keenly interested in progress to date. An interest that was removed last week by this large gift. Mr. Licata had been visiting his sister and her husband when Mr. Restivo asked the inevitable question: "How's the hospital doing?" and followed it up by asking him to deliver the \$3,000 cheque as his contribution.

Coming as it does midway in construction, and with some of the government grants as yet unclaimed, the gift is a big help to the fund.

Mr. Restivo's home is in Hamilton, where he has moved since 1925. He arrived in Georgetown in 1912, where he located his first fruit business in Louise Beauty Lounge. At that time he operated his fruit and vegetable business using a horse and wagon for delivery. In 1922 he bought the present Caruso building, and transferred his business to that location. He continued to operate from there until 1930. At that time he sold his business to Dick Licata, who is Mr. Restivo's brother in law. He is still considering Georgetown his home, however, he continues to reside here until 1931, when due to ill health Mr. Restivo and his wife moved to Hamilton, where they have since made their home. He could be nearer his doctors. A diabetic, he had suffered from this condition since 1925. Although forced to leave town, he continued to look upon the community as his home, and is always eager to have news of it.

**Brampton Judge Had  
Brother Minister Here**

Judge Archibald Cochrane, 89, Peel County judge for 24 years, died Friday in hospital after a brief illness.

His brother, Rev. Charles Cochrane, now of Westmount, Quebec, was minister at Knox and Lanehouse Presbyterian churches prior to Rev. Alex Calder.

Mr. Cochrane was born in Kingston and educated in Belleville and Osgoode law school. He was called to the bar in 1912 and practiced in Toronto from 1912 to 1915 when he went overseas with the Canadian Field Artillery. He was wounded twice.

He practiced in Cobourg after the war and later moved to Brampton where he was appointed judge in 1936. In 1951 he was appointed by the government to lead a sensational investigation of the Windsor police department.

During the second World War Judge Cochrane served as the chairman of District 2 of the federal mobilization board.

He was president of the Ontario Curling Association in 1952-53, an elder of Grace United Church, Brampton, and was active in the Canadian Legion.

He leaves his wife, Ethel Vixan Brown, a daughter, Mrs. Brian Skinner of Toronto, and two brothers, Rev. Charles Cochrane of Westmount, Que., and Dr. A. C. Cochrane, a professor of philosophy at Dubuque University in Iowa.
