

## Chose Edwin Wilson Board Chairman Again

Public School Board Chairman E. W. Wilson shouldered the responsibility for the seventh time when the local board elected their officers for 1961 at their inaugural meeting last Wednesday night at Harrison Public School.

James F. Evans was re-appointed business administrator and the standing committees of Stan Finlay and Don Powers, finance; Harry Shortill and Roy Hansen, property; Ray Salter, management; and Roy Hansen, planning, were unchanged. The first two committees are chaired by Mr. Finlay and Mr. Shortill respectively and the latter two head committees of the whole.

Four of the present board, Ed Wilson, Ray Salter, Stan Finlay and Harry Shortill were members of the original public school board which was formed in 1950 when the old board of education was dissolved. Mr. Salter, however, temporarily retired during the 1958-59 term.

Mr. Hansen was elected to the board three years ago and Mr. Powers was appointed to the board last year to complete the term of Kelvin Brown who moved from town. He retained his seat in the recent municipal election.

In the eleven year period Mr. Wilson has held the position of chairman seven times, from 1950 through 1953, and again from 1959.

Other appointments included Kennedy principal Hazel Allen to the Public Library Board for a second term, and Harold Moy et was retained as attendance

officer for the five schools. The board also has two other representatives on the Library Board, Mrs. Nellie Gardiner and T. H. Van Sickle.

During the business the chairman, Mr. Wilson, requested Mr. Hansen and his committee to keep an especially close check this year on the matter of future classroom accommodation. According to a preschool survey, the total enrollment is expected to surpass the 2,000 mark in two years.

A new teacher was hired at the meeting. Miss Penny Pick, a native of Port Credit who has been teaching at North York will fill the vacancy created by the recent resignation of Mrs. Lovell.
