

Raiders Hold Third Place, Beat Dundas

Georgetown Raiders' mastery over Dundas Graftons showed little sign of crumbling last Wednesday night when the Raiders' club for the third time in their three meetings, 5-1 on Dundas ice.

In their first two meetings in OHA Central Ontario League competition this season, Raiders triumphed 8-4 and 7-5. The win was the Raiders' 8th and enabled them to maintain their hold on third spot in the seven team league. They also have five losses and a tie.

Now I'm no ice fisherman, but if there's fishing involved I'm all for it. And from what George reports, Everett Allen, the proprietor of Allen's Cabins is the fisherman to show any beginner, like myself, just how this ice fishing is done.

A day fishing for a party of local sportsmen may come from George and Eugene's visit to Shanty Bay, as in my book, 8 lbs. of lake trout is worth an hour's drive. More on this later.

It is unfortunate that the continual misuse of hunting privileges by a certain class of the present day hunter is gradually causing the posting of "No Trespassing" signs on much of the hunting area left.

While the owner has some legal means to protect his property or attempt to do so, this, in itself, offers little solution to the problem. It is regrettable that the majority of hunter-sportsmen and private property owners suffer as a result of those who ignore the common courtesies of getting permission first and encouraging cooperation.

Certainly much is to be gained by promoting the efforts of good sportsmen and other agencies, educational efforts and good hunter-farmer relations that mean continuation of this form of recreation.

Small game hunters should keep in mind that it is a privilege for them to hunt on privately owned land and their hunting licence does not give them this authority without permission from the landowner.

Think of it this way. Would you like your neighbour, or someone you don't even know, walking all over your lawn or garden, looking for dew worms, etc. without your permission? I know I wouldn't!
