### Sweep Dundas Series Raiders Have 19 Points

### Raiders Have 19 Points Rare Penalty Shot Highlights Game

The most attractive group of wins the Raiders have been able to assemble since the start of the 60-61 campaign, five in six games, was made possible last week by a sweep of the home and home Dundas series which concluded here Friday night with an 8-5 Raiders triumph.

But what prestige he picked up from the local customers on that dash was dissolved in a later penalty shot.

Cyril, the pursuer on a break away by Beaumont in the final period, apparently looked up and saw Dick Shatto romping for the end zone. He discarded his stick and executed a spectacular flying tackle that sent them both sliding past the net but foiled the attempt albeit illegally. "He drew about as much appreciation as would Pete Newman swinging a hockey stick around Tobin Rote's ears. The resulting penalty shot was blocked and Cyril stayed on the ice.

### Canadians Talk More Phone Report Shows

Canadians continue to be the "talkative" people, the world averaging more than 550 telephone conversations per person. Islanders follow with about 508, conversations per person, and telephone users in the United States pace third with 406.

The number of telephones per 100 population, Canada is third with 30.85. The U.S. is second with 35.50, Sweden with 14.8 telephones per 100, and Russia with 19, are at the bottom of the scale of major countries in the number of telephones per capita.

These are signs of the high status of the 1960's age of "The World's Telephones," compiled by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

According to "The World's Telephones," the number of telephones in the world rose to 123,000,000 in 1959, a gain of almost 9,000,000 over the previous year. About 3,430,000 of these are in Canada.

Montreal has more telephones than any other city in Canada with 655,702. Toronto is second with 505,812, and Vancouver with 248,323, is third. New York City has the greatest number of phones of any city in the world, 4,411,982, and Greater London follows with 2,236,000.

Since 1950, the report shows, the number of telephones in the world has almost doubled. In the United States, telephones increased 74 per cent in that period, while in Asia the number of phones more than tripled. In Europe and South America, they doubled. No growth figures were available from Russia.

All information in the report relates to the beginning of 1960. It takes nearly a year to gather statistics from the more than 200 countries.
