Form Credit Union Holy Cross Parish

Choose Officers at Meeting Tomorrow

After considerable preparatory work the Holy Cross Parish Credit Union has finally reached the point of formal inauguration. The corporate charter was received in early December with more than 20 original charter members. Since then interest and enthusiasm has been steadily growing. Prospects appear very bright. The program executive envisage near total participation within the parish.

Even those remotely familiar with the operations of a Credit Union can see many advantages. The participants are shareholders having a vote in major policy decisions. Prospective members are given a choice of the number of shares held each member has only one vote. The executive, except for the treasurer, contribute their efforts on a non-monetary basis. The treasurer normally receives only a token stipend. Consequently the operating costs are held to a minimum. The revenue from loans is largely returned to the shareholders. This results in comparatively large percentage dividends, normally in the order of 4 to 5%.

Call Tenders Soon Kelso Dam Project

Tenders will soon be called in the general contract for the \$32,000,000 Kelso Dam project north-west of Milton. During the past few weeks the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority has approved tenders for various parts of the work including one at \$25,800 to English Electric for electrically operated sluice gate and one to Harmond Construction Ltd. at \$1,200 for stream diversion necessary before the start of construction.

General Contract R. E. Kilborn & Associates consultants for the authority on water storage, construction, parksite and swimming and camping area four miles from Milton, have drafted the general contract for the work. It covers concrete work and earthwork and requires approval of the Department of Planning and Development.

Become Alarmed The Authority has recently become alarmed over reports that quarrying interests are purchasing land above and below the Niagara Escarpment in the townships of East and West Gwillimbury, near Six-mile View. Chairman Dr. C. A. Martin explains he feels it is the responsibility of the authority to take steps to preserve the face of the mountain, and the Authority is seeking steps to get around the problem. The solicitor was asked to continue the quarrying interests for diversion on the matter, and the Authority has begun a survey of land ownerships in the area.

Discuss Museum Authority members have set up a meeting with Halton County Council's agricultural committee, to discuss formation of a museum. The group is also meeting with the curator of the Metropolitan Toronto Conservation Authority's museum for information on a conservation board.

Solicitor Retained Milton Solicitor General Elliott, Q.C., has been retained by the Authority as solicitor, and the Twelve Mile Creek Conservation Authority will share the cost of his retainer.

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Bus Victims Awarded \$52,000 Damages

Damages of \$52,281 were awarded to three Wellington County girls and their fathers last week for injuries suffered by the girls when a school bus and a Canadian Pacific Railway freight train collided at Hillsburgh, on January 28th, 1960. Mr. Justice W. F. Spence of the Supreme Court of Ontario awarded Diane McKinney, 17, \$19,000; Marilyn Baldwin, 18, \$14,000 and Patricia McLaren, 16, \$11,000. The girls' fathers J. H. Baldwin, Cyril McKinney and J. H. McLaren, were granted special damages of \$3,122, \$3,337 and \$1,722, respectively. Eleven other students were injured when the bus caught fire after the collision.

At the time of the accident, the bus was returning from the school to take pupils home. Mr. Justice Spence, who heard the non-jury action at Guelph, brought against A. Leo Lyons and the Erie-District High School Board, expressed the opinion that Mr. Leitch's failure to keep a proper lookout was the sole cause of the accident.

The judge said Mr. Leitch failed to require Miss Awrey to stand to the rear of the driver's seat, and did not keep his vehicle under control, so he could stop before entering the level crossing.

He found that Mr. Lyons and Mr. Leitch were servants of the high school board because of a continuous series of directions on driving given to them, and notwithstanding the contract for bus service which Mr. Lyons held with the board. Miss McKinney was severely scarred in the accident. Mr. Justice Spence said, "Cosmetic damage is very real damage, and is a major interference with the enjoyment of life, particularly in the case of a young unmarried girl," the judge said. He observed that Miss Baldwin was seriously burned and Miss McLaren burned and scarred.

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
