SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

Fish fishing is now well underway in most districts and Conservation Officer Boyes reports some good size pike being taken in shallow water areas near Waubesa, Pike and perch are the only two species so far reported in that vicinity. A number of anglers report good catches of herring, some whitefish and a few lake trout also being taken.

The progress being made on the construction on the fishway at Nicholson dam is proceeding excellently. Nicholson dam is located a short distance east of Alliston on Hwy. 89.

The project, undertaken by the Dept. of Public Works was started after considerable investigation of the trouble rainbow trout had each year in their efforts to reach the headwaters of the Nottawasaga and tributaries.

From present indications the fishway should be in operation for the coming spring and Department of Fish and Wildlife staff will be devoting considerable time to necessary checks and assessing results.

Last week's friend of mine, my wife and I were looking over some Dept. of Lands and Forests maps that I had written to the Dept. for and received these maps are just the thing for any sportsman planning any fishing or hunting trips. They come in a variety of scales from 1 mile to the inch to 100 miles to the inch.

The number of the main map is 20A and is a map of Ontario. This map serves as an index for other maps of larger scales. From this map you can obtain a map of any area, showing landmarks, points of interest, all rivers and lakes in a certain area. And best of all this map is free for the writing of a letter to the Dept. of Lands and Forests, Division of Surveys and Engineering, Parliament Bldg., Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

Below is a list of films that will be shown on the Social nights of the Georgetown Anglers and Hunters Association. On January 26th there will be three films. 1st: Beyond the Andes; 2nd: Canadian Ski Preview; 3rd: Boats, Motors and People.
