

Raider Win Puts Locals In Tie for First Place

Irons Returns to The Raider Line-Up

With a good size mid-week crowd looking on Georgetown Raiders continued as the hottest club in the COHL last Wednesday night surprising their Bradford marsh cousins 5 to 4 to top over Barrie into a two way tie for first place.

The Georgetown win was their 6th in seven games and tenth on the season and with their one tie gave them a point total of 21 equaled only by Brad's Fords, who have played one more game than the Raiders.

Ironically it was an ex-ford, Frazer Dunn who spearheaded the Raider scoring. Dunn scored at 10:26 of the first period to open a 1-0 lead but Falls put the visiting Fords on even feet five minutes later when he scored.

Gerry Inglis made a fine length of the ice dash just seconds after the middle period got under way to regain the one goal advantage for Georgetown and Dunn stung his former mates for the second time in the 8:57 mark on a three cornered play started by Blake Inglis and Junior Beaumont.

Bradford was quick to retaliate this time with Don (Spider) Gibson on the scoring end at 9:37 with McCaig and Millon picking up assist. Bob Demerse's goal from Doug Richardson and Dave Irons with 9 seconds left in the frame gave the locals the margin they needed to survive a determined bid by the Fords which came close to succeeding in the third period.

Gary Vasey scored the Bradford tally at 12:57 from Davis which sparked his club to that extra effort that had the slim Raider lead looking very insufficient at that stage. But in their eagerness to close the gap Bradford tripped themselves up. A full two minutes and twenty seconds was left on the clock when they iced their sixth attacker and the unguarded net was too much of a lure for too long. Falls attempted to cover up but Beaumont had little trouble in denting the

Bradford twice with goal number 3 while the Bradford goalie looked on from the bench.

That was at 18:27 and made it 5 to 3 but the scoring wasn't over yet. With just twenty seconds remaining, Patton from Vasey and Falls beat Rhodes from close in and again pulled within a single goal of the lead and again the net was emptied for an extra forward. Raiders were working in on the unprotected cage when the final buzzer halted the charge.

A big factor in the Raider win, as in a brace of past triumphs was the play of Raider freshman Don Hunter who was a standout at his defensive position. Hunter rushed effectively and looked solid when he was called on to make a key check. Dave Irons made his first appearance in weeks, added scoring punch to the lineup though used sparingly. His return allowed Elmer Lee to shift Joe Auger back to the blueline where he plays his best hockey.

SHORT SHOTS Including this game Raiders have scored 83 goals so far this season and have been scored on 73 times. Dave Voyce has been classed as a non-import by the OHA and the decision left Raiders with one waiver to use up in a hurry. They've got their eye on an import forward.

Grasby Goal Saves Bradford Blanking

A goal by George Grasby with less than three minutes to go kept Raiders from being blanked by Bradford in a free wheeling affair in onlonville Saturday night.

Still scrambling for a piece of first place the Ford's handcuffed the Raiders for 57 minutes while they banged in four unanswered markers and potted a goal after the Raiders' first score, to thump the locals, 5 to 1.

The win enabled the Ford's to draw up head and head with Georgetown in their dash to the COHL wire.

Significant in this one was the fact that the Bradford scoring blunder was by the Raiders' line-up grew storer. Dave Irons was first to leave the game when he was injured by a slash across the back of his hand. Referee Bob Naden penalized Irons on the play and the call so infuriated Frazer Dunn that Naden waved him out of the game.

Gerry Inglis made an attempt to stay in the fray after twisting his back when ridden in on the boards but his knee collapsed when he was crashed a second time. A five minute major to Doug Richardson near the end of the game eliminated him.

Victory Over Oakville Oaks, 5-4 Puts Raiders in League Top Spot

Gerry Inglis' Goal Wins In Overtime

The third member of Raider's retreating team, Alf Trotta, got his baptism of rubber Friday night in Oakville and came away comparatively unscathed.

Trotta allowed just 4 pucks past him, two of them in rapid succession in the first period, as Raiders skated into sole possession of first place in the COHL by winning 5 to 4. Trotta was recognized for his sparkling debut by being chosen one of the game's three stars.

Oakville's hockey conscious populace who shunned the arena like the plague when a third place Raider team made their first appearance of the season in the home of the Oaks in late November, turned out in force to witness a first place contender. Friday.

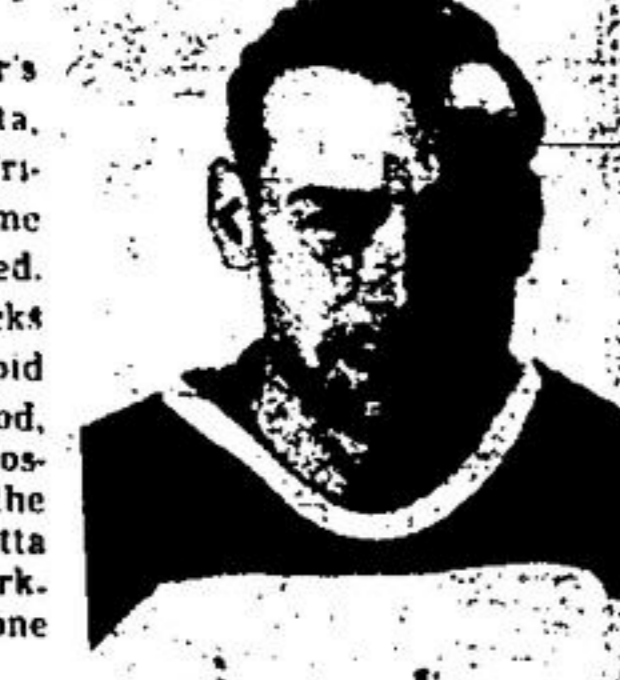
They saw a real see-saw struggle in which the Oaks punched in two goals before the game was 4 minutes old. Raiders drew even before the period was out and both clubs held brief leads throughout regulation time which ended in a 4-4 deadlock. A hard, rising shot by Gerry Inglis from just inside the blueline won it in the extra period.

Of their 17 games, including this one, the Raiders have won 11, lost 5 and tied 1 for 23 points.

Wally Maxwell from Ford and Hawkins and McKay from Hall and Dryden scored goals within seconds of each other, at 3:42 and 3:51 of the first period to rock the locals with a quick 2-0 lead. Bud Vasey chopped that in half at the 6:05 mark with assistance from Doug Richardson and Bob Demerse, and the lead evaporated at 13:06 of the same period when Junior Beaumont finished a play started by Demerse and Dave Irons.

Irons, who was also a standout, steered Joe Auger's pass into the Oak's net at 5:54 of the middle period and Raiders had their first lead in the game. That was wiped out at the mid-way mark when Hawkins was left alone in front of Trotta who had no chance on the shot.

Oakville's 4-3 lead created at 7:06 of the third frame on a goal by McKay from Dryden, stood up until only 5 and a half minutes remained in regulation time. Big Don Hunter was the marksmen from just inside the Oakville blueline, after Junior Beaumont set him up. The winner was scored at 2:18 of the overtime on a similar play. Gerry Inglis, fed by Demerse and Auger, rifled a shot that hit just inside the left goal post and glanced behind Oak goalie John Miller.
