## Add New Health Service For Retarded Children

In an effort to acquaint the parents of handicapped children with the various types of help they may receive, the North Halton Association for Retarded Children reports that a comparatively new service has been added for the policy holders of Ontario Hospital Service Insurance, covering dental care for patients with cerebral palsy and mentally retarded children. These children present a special problem to dentists because of either their inability to stay still, or lack of understanding of what is required of them in the dentist's chair.

The Ontario Hospital Service Commission has, therefore, issued a statement to all Public General Hospitals, stating that: "Effective June 1, 1960, hospital benefits will be provided for patients with cerebral palsy and mentally retarded children, for general dentistry and extractions, for whatever period is indicated."

There are special forms available at the hospitals for parents to fill in. If by any chance the hospital does not have these forms, the doctor or dentist may present a letter to the hospital, requesting the dental treatment required. This is a very fine service to be covered by the Ontario Insurance, as some families have had tremendous problems in securing proper dental care for these handicapped children. Unfortunately not too many hospitals as yet have dental equipment included as standard procedure, but it is hoped that hospital boards will realize the importance of this equipment in future building plans.

## Laud Rev. Charles Gower As Forceful Evangelist

The funeral service was held Thursday, January 12th, in Petrolia Baptist Church for Rev. Charles R. Gower who for three years held the Georgetown-Acton pastoral charge.

The funeral was largely attended, the Baptist Church being filled with friends from Petrolia and district for the service. Rev. S. R. McClung of Central Baptist Church, Sarnia, past president of the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec presided, and a glowing tribute to the deceased was given in the address by Rev. Roy C. Cook of Chatham. Prayer was offered by Dr. D. A. Burns, D.D. of Toronto, Sup't of the Baptist Home Mission Board. The Brooke and Enniskillen Baptist Church quartette sang "In the Sweet Bye and Bye."

The pallbearers were six deacons of the Church, Lloyd Park, Basil Bourne, Norman White, James O'Dell, Charles Beldon and Don Metcalfe. Interment was in Dresden Cemetery.

Rev. Mr. Gower was born near West Lorne, Ontario, in January 1893, a son of the late Richard and Mary Gower, and spent his boyhood in Stony Creek and St. Catharines districts. As a young man he became a lay preacher in the Methodist Church and took regular services near Dunnville. He enlisted in the Canadian Army in the First World War and served overseas.

Upon his return to Canada he took up farming west of Oil City and again came to serve in the Methodist Church. Later he was called to conduct regular services on the Baptist Ministerial Charge of Brooke and Enniskillen and Oil Springs churches, and while there in April 1926 he was baptized in the Baptist faith by Rev. W. H. Halthey of Petrolia Baptist Church. He attended McMaster Divinity School, Toronto, and 31 years ago he was ordained in the B. & E. Church. He had since served on the Alvin, West Lorne, Dresden, Waterford, Georgetown, Acton and Dresden a second time, going to Petrolia in April 1957.

The late clergyman was highly esteemed not only in his own congregation but by those of other churches as well. He had a friendly and sincere manner and in the pulpit he was a forceful and effective preacher of the Word with a strong evangelistic ring in his messages. He held a strong belief in tithing for Christian giving and rated the mid-week prayer service as important as the two on Sunday.

He was past member of the Home Mission Board of the Ontario - Quebec Convention of Baptist Churches, the Moderator of the Middlesex - Lambton Baptist Association and the secretary of the local Ministerial Association. For five years he was a radio preacher over the Chatham station and many letters testified to the spiritual help received from his discourses.

Mr. Gower is survived by his wife, the former Pearl Stephens whom he married 41 years ago; three sons, Lyle and Donald, both of Kitchener, Victor of St. Catharines; two daughters, Mrs. Hugh Turner (Leila) of Dresden and Mrs. Glen Kirk (Beth) of Chippewa; two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Fawell of St. Catharines and Miss Ethel Gower of Paris, Ont. and a brother, Alvah of St. Catharines, and 11 grandchildren.

## Arm, Shoulder Injuries When Struck by Car

Esquiesing Reeve Cam Sinclair expressed the feeling of the congregation when he addressed Mr. and Mrs. Calder at the end of a brief musical program and on behalf of those assembled William Cromar presented the departing minister with an engraved tray and a purse of money. Roses from the congregation were presented to Mrs. Calder by Herb Cleaver, Mr. and Mrs. Calder replied after receiving their respective gifts.

Accompanied by church organist Mrs. Ed Gowland, and a quartette of men, E. Karn, Dick Packer, Harry Ingram and Ed Gowland led in group singing during the musical program. The soloist was Tom Trouten. A buffet, prepared by the ladies of the church, was enjoyed following the presentations.
