**William Robert Pewtress Prominent, Masonic Lodge**

Hornby 83 Years

Pewtress and Bruce Pewtress, nephews Stan Robinson and Cecil Wilson.

Well-known active resident of the Hornby district for the 83 years, William Robert Pewtress, 91, died on January 23, 1961, at the St. George's Hospital after a brief illness.

Mrs. Pewtress piled up an excellent record in the Hornby district before his death. Born in Mills, May 23, 1869, he moved to Halton when he was 12 to the Lot 12, Conc. 5 farm where he spent his early years.

Married to the late Annie May Medforth in 1891, he later moved to R.R. 1, Hornby and spent the last 31 years of his life there. An active member of St. Clair Masonic Lodge 135 for 61 years, he died in 1900, was Master of the lodge in 1909, received his 50 year membership in 1950 and then in 1959, received his Past Master 50 year membership.

Mr. Pewtress was very active in community life until his last three years. Scoring cigarettes, but enjoying the odd cigar, he loved to play and boasted good eye for eye. He enjoyed meeting people and sharing his many fond memories accumulated during his lifetime.

He operated the farm until 1945 and drove a mail route from the Hornby Post Office, retiring in 1945. Surviving besides his wife, Mrs. Annie Medforth of R.R. 1, are two sons, Kenneth of R.R. 4, and seven grandchildren. He was preceded by a brother, William, and sisters, Mary (Parker), Margaret (Mrs. George Robinson) and Charlotte (Mrs. George Wilson).

Funeral services were held at the McKersie Funeral Home on Monday 13 with Rev. J. E. Well of St. Stephen's Anglican Church, Hornby, officiating. Members of St. Clair Masonic Lodge attended.

Interment was at the Presbyterian Church, Hornby, with district residents William Robinson, George Galbraith, Frank Holm, Ted Robinson, George Bridgen and Clarence Peasall as pallbearers. Flower bearers were grandsons Bobby
