People frequently ask me whether private Members of Parliament can achieve much. I indeed obtain much satisfaction from their work at Ottawa. It must be difficult, people point out, in the case of members of a party forming particularly with a substantial majority.

While it is hard to generalize from York - Scarborough, I usually reply that it is entirely possible for a Member of Parliament to make definite and substantial contributions and to gain much satisfaction from his or her work. Of course some do not. In every party there may be those who find it difficult to adjust to a routine different from their profession or occupation before they were elected, and of course it depends greatly upon the individual. It is entirely possible to make a distinct contribution in the form of our changes in existing legislation, new legislation achieved, or perhaps in the more subtle areas of public opinion and knowledge.

I can think of a number of instances where Members have achieved beneficial results. All, of course, have to deal with many hundreds of social and industrial problems. Nevertheless many work as well in certain larger fields of area of national interest. Frank Atkinson, for example,

Yes, if exists in Canada too, as you undoubtedly realize.

As I said before, it disgusts me because, while the politicians indulge in mutual recrimination, the true vital interests of the Canadian people are entirely neglected.

What is the main concern of Parliament today? Is it unemployment? No! Is it Health Insurance? No! Adequate Old Age Pension? No! It is the callous gathering of as much political ammunition as each party can hope to amass in preparation for the next Federal election. Yes, the only issue upon which all parties can generate maximum enthusiasm is the one to be decided by the next Federal election, which could be two years hence!

Perhaps it is too much to ask that the true National welfare be the only concern of the politicians, so long as party loyalties actually demand disloyalty. For unconsciously such, in my opinion, is the case.

I personally would rather be a happy, healthy, secure citizen than a good Tory, Liberal or Socialist. I know in my heart that most of the people of Canada share these desires.
