Ontario Government Announces Unemployed Education Scheme

An extended training program aimed at re-establishing unemployed persons has been announced by the Hon. John P. Roberts, Ontario Minister of Education. Two To Ten Courses will vary in length from two to ten months and will provide training for approximately 1400 people over a 12 month period, the Minister said.

Mr. Roberts stressed that the program is designed to train and re-train persons for employment in business and industry and is being developed with the cooperation of the National Employment Service and the Federal Department of Labour. Many Courses Courses will be offered in radio and television service, drafting, welding, diesel mechanics, appliance servicing, business machine servicing, food industry servicing, furniture repairing and upholstering, small internal combustion machine servicing and shoe repairing.

The courses are designed for the Metropolitan Toronto area where the greatest concentration of unemployed exists, and will be conducted at the Provincial Institute of Trades on Nassau Street. Offered Soon Mr. Roberts said that the courses are now being prepared and will be offered as trainees are selected. The program is over and beyond the present apprenticeship training program which has been conducted for many years at the Provincial Institute of Trades. Federal Assistance On December 12, 1960, the Federal Government passed Bill C-49 an act respecting Technical and Vocational Training Assistance, which greatly extended its participation in the field of technical training. The new training program in Ontario is designed to take advantage of the increased Federal assistance provided by this bill.

Add Regulations For School Buses

It was announced today by Hon. H. L. Rowan, Q.C., Minister of Transport for Ontario that additional regulations governing the operation of school buses had been made by order in council. The Minister said that the new regulations granted in all vehicles operated by an under contract to school boards, and vehicles used solely for the purposes of transporting children to and from school. The regulations require that all such vehicles be clearly marked with signs reading "School Bus". All vehicles, when used solely for transportation of children, shall be painted yellow with black trim. They also required all vehicles carrying ten or more children to have the following safety equipment at all times: Mr. Rowan emphasized they must have an amber maror, tire chains of snow tires on rear wheels except during a speedometer, the body door constructed in such a way as to prevent the entry of children's limbs, two windshield wipers, and a defrosting device, inside lights, an axe or clubaxe and a fire extinguisher, operable tires, and emergency exits. The Minister added that all vehicles used as school buses would require a certificate of mechanical fitness being filed twice a year. In respect to the requirements of school buses, Mr. Rowan said that all applicants must be 25 years of age or over and would be required to pass a special driving test. A higher standard of proficiency would be required in the test, with special emphasis on knowledge of the rules of the road and sign recognition. The test would also contain references to bus and equipment maintenance. The driving test must be taken in an actual school bus. The applicants for school bus operator's licences would be required to file a medical certificate of physical fitness and a standard of vision higher than is required for an ordinary driver. The Minister said that he thought these new regulations would do much to ensure the safer operation of our school buses and the safety of their valuable cargoes.
