Mr. Bornhold said there is no margin for argument since the public school act states clearly that the system is to train children to live in a Christian, Democratic, and Christian education period in the school are certainly in line with this.

cost money, perhaps \$300 per foot frontage, perhaps much more. But it is one suggestion, that could be considered," he said.

Cr. Ian Cass had presented the idea of a street mall, similar to that which has been created in Ottawa and a sketch of this had appeared in the Herald some time ago, he continued.

It is such ideas which, if merchants wish to discuss them, should be done before any money is spent on roadwork, the mayor thinks.

Financial cold water was thrown on any hope for government participation by Mr. Brown when he stressed that there are no substantial grants for any redevelopment which does not include housing as its major feature.

Queried by the mayor on plans which he had heard about in Windsor and Sarnia, Mr. Brown said in these cases the areas were a mixture of residential and commercial, with emphasis on the former.

However, he suggested that Georgetown could make a redevelopment study, and might receive a 75% cost share from the government for this.

Up to the present, such studies have been concentrated on residential surveys, he said, and he could give no assurance that the government might share costs of a commercial study.

A merchants' spokesman, Paul Barber opined that relieving traffic pressure is the main consideration in the minds of businessmen at present.

"We need parking lots and want to get cars from Main St. to get customers into our stores. Level street widening or a shopping mall are problems of magnitude. I know businessmen are willing to pay for parking lots, but I feel they are unable to pay for a half million dollar improvement plan," he said.

Mayor Hyde replied that council has indicated it will cooperate in parking lots.

"But I was led to believe at a meeting last week that merchants wished to discuss reconstruction too," he continued.

"We're talking about two projects, resurfacing and parking, which will cost \$200,000," said Cr. Ian Cass. "The question is whether we will embark on these piecemeal, or tie them into a long-range master plan."

## GEORGETOWN LIBERALS ARE ORGANIZING

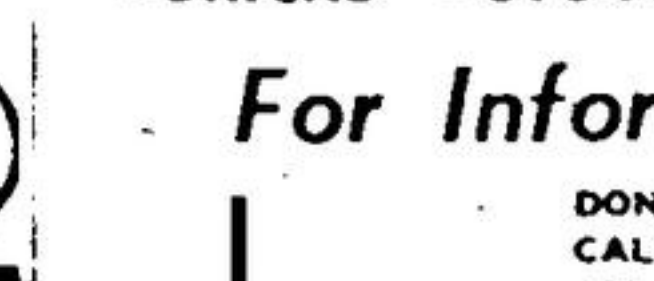
Although no election date has been announced by the federal government, Halton county Liberals are organizing, and the Georgetown association is no exception.

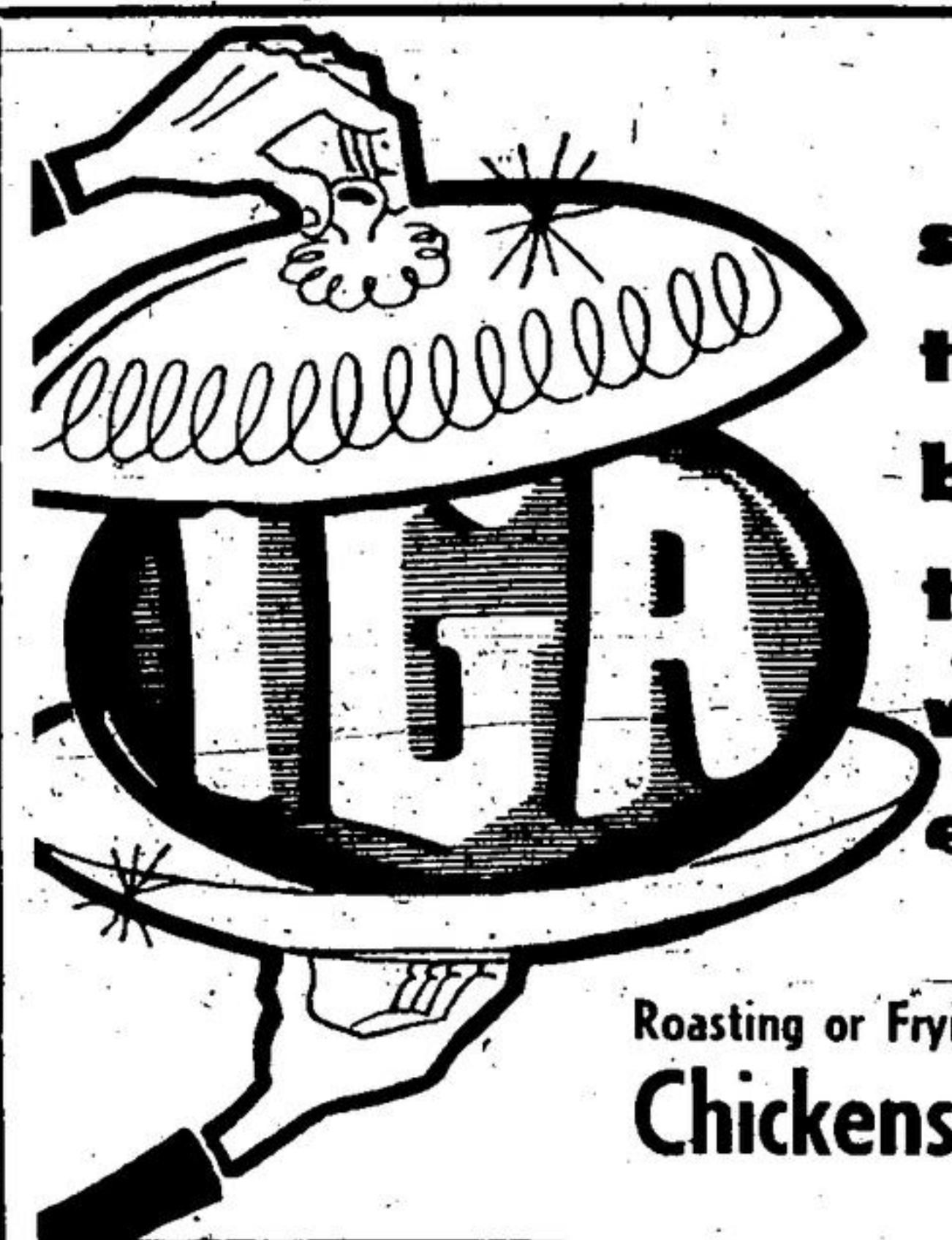
