## Cleanliness, Discipline Prime Concern at Arena

Dear Sir:  
Kindly permit me space in your 'Mail Bag' to answer the letters of January 30th from Mr. McBryde and Mr. Lawr. who seem to be sadly misinformed of the conditions at the Georgetown Memorial Arena.

Firstly, re waiting room supervision and cleanliness. We have a very capable doorman, who has worked at the Arena in previous seasons, and is quite capable of handling the disciplinary problems in this area.

When we opened up in the Fall we had great plans for cleanliness, as could be evidenced by the clean-up and paint-job done throughout the entire building. Waste containers were placed in various obvious locations, but unfortunately continue to go unused.

Our oral efforts were met with rebuke from parents and children alike. (Some have even complained to the Arena Board.) We were informed that these conditions have always prevailed and there is little we can do to prevent them. (Evidently children, and adults too, do not deem it necessary to carry their home manners in to the Arena.)

As for lack of co-operation from the staff, it would be hard for me to comment on this matter as no one has complained to me about any of our staff. If Mr. McBryde has a complaint, I would certainly welcome the opportunity of making his acquaintance (I don't know the man) and would do everything in my power to rectify the problem. We do believe, however, that Mr. McBryde should speak from experience and not hearsay, as in our opinion he has taken a very extraordinary course in airing his erroneous views in the 'Herald' before discussing anything with the management.

Finally, the last of his mis-statements. Re skating hours. There has never been, to the best of our knowledge (there were no records left in the Arena when I took over) a three hour Saturday afternoon skating.

Now, with respect to Mr. Lawr's letter. The Arena is publicly owned. Yes, but it also has to be run as a business and the majority of taxpayers are willing to pay their way. It is not a public place in the sense that anyone should be able to wander in or out at anytime of the day or night, or use it as a hang-out. Also, Arena equipment cannot be made available to every taxpayer for his own personal use.

It appears that Mr. Lawr thinks it should, as he was very unhappy when refused the use of an ice scraper.

In the past the Arena has been used as a hangout by teenage boys and girls who wrote on the walls and did considerable property damage. This we have endeavoured to discourage by locking up the lobby when it was not required by those using the ice.
