

Ambulance Calls Average Three Per Week For GVAS

Annual Meeting Elects Harold Gilmer as Chief

Ambulance calls averaging three per week were answered by the 90-man Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Association in 1960. It was revealed when a report of activities was given at the annual meeting in the auditorium of Wrigglesworth school last week.

The organization, a "first" in Canada when it was organized in 1957 when the local funeral director found it unprofitable to continue such service on a private basis. The idea of a volunteer group, modelled along the lines of a volunteer fire department found favour among a group of local men, and within a short time was functioning efficiently with the ambulance purchased from the former operator. Since then a new machine has been added, with the old one serving as an auxiliary when required.

Calls on the ambulance service have increased each year since it was organized. In the ten months of operation in 1957 there were 95 calls. The next year there were 122, and in 1959 there were 140.

At present the GVAS is planning a St. John Ambulance first aid course for members. At the meeting, Harold Gilmer was elected chief, succeeding Edwin Hall who has given sterling service in the position after taking over from the first chief Ralph Hawes. Councillor Jim Brown, who heads the council committee in charge of ambulance affairs, acted as chairman for the election which was followed by a film "Explosion at Ripple Rock" and serving of refreshments.
