

Thirty-Four Teams Enter in Easter Bantam Tournament

GOOD PUBLICITY EVENT TO BOOST GEORGETOWN

Thirty-four teams are booked for the Georgetown bantam hockey tournament during Easter week. And the town will be buzzing with young visitors as far away as Ganouque in the east to Leamington in the south.

Lending an international flavour is an entry from Detroit, Michigan. And promoters have still not given up hope that an expected entry from Winnipeg will make the tournament an inter-provincial one.

Brainchild of hockey enthusiast Jack Gudgeon, who conceived the idea to serve the 'under 14' age group, the Georgetown affair is being well-planned by an executive headed by Walter (Red) Asseltine, Paul Armstrong, Bill Fisher and Mr. Gudgeon.

There is plenty of detail involved in such an undertaking, and the organization is receiving sterling support from such sources as the All-Star Support Group, service clubs, the Legion, and dozens of private citizens.

Some of the things which take major planning — Bill letting 17 of the visiting teams for one or more nights. Serving of 175 boys per meal at lunch and dinner during the week. Tight scheduling of games each day and provision of dressing room attendants, scorekeepers and time-keepers. Salesmen for booster tickets... door attendants... entertainment for boys between games... provision of trophies... assurance of referees for all games.

The tournament will bring widespread publicity to Georgetown of the type that has made Goderich a byword for its Young Canada tournament.

SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

WARNING: To all ducks, pheasants, partridge, etc., in the Georgetown area.

Be on the lookout for sharpshooters, when the next hunting season rolls around.

I thought these upland game birds should be given fair warning.

Because from the indication at the Georgetown Angler and Hunters Association trap range, there will be an ever increasing amount of sharpshooters, hunting these birds next year, and few birds will escape from the trained eyes and trigger fingers of these hunters.

Trap shooting nowadays is considered a sport and it is quite true that shooting trap is great sport.

But more important, it is one of the many steps in educating and building a true sportsman and hunter.

And though trap shooting was a practise used years ago to improve on a hunter's skill, it is now considered a great sport for both king and commoner.

Fred Howse, trap chairman reports some 700 rounds of shells were shot off last Sunday and Fred expects more than that for this Sunday, as he is now signing up some shooters to form teams for further competitions.

Yours truly is shooting 50 percent right now, which is up from 30 percent one-week ago!

This isn't good shooting but it does show improvement and will, by next season, mean less wounded birds escaping and savings in ammunition, and this practise will also mean less hunting accidents.
