Skates Popular Present For Indian Children

More than 300 Indian children in Northern Ontario are taking to ice on their first real skates thanks to the residents of southern Ontario. The skates were the first shipment of more than 2,000 pairs already collected by the King Whyte Skate program.

Mr. Whyte, an outdoorsman and television personality, inaugurated the program to collect outgrown and unused skates just before Christmas. The skates were collected at Cities Service Oil Company service stations across Ontario. The oil company also agreed to cover any additional costs of the program.

The first shipment of skates was just flown in by Mr. Whyte and the RCAF to the large Indian residential school and to the reservation at Fort Albany, 700 miles north of Toronto on James Bay. Another load was dropped off at the Indian village of Winkik, several hundred miles further north on Hudson Bay. Mr. Whyte reported, "The Mission Fathers told me their boys have been skating on barrel staves and old skate blades nailed to boards until recently. But if anyone wanted to know how much the children liked the skates they should have seen the hockey game the older boys put on for us before we left."

Many organizations cooperated in the program. Once the skates were gathered in Toronto at the Cities Service warehouse, they were sharpened and refurbished by CCM. With new laces, they are sorted and packed in areas on their regular supply and several chartered airlines will fly the skates in to remote areas on their regular supply.

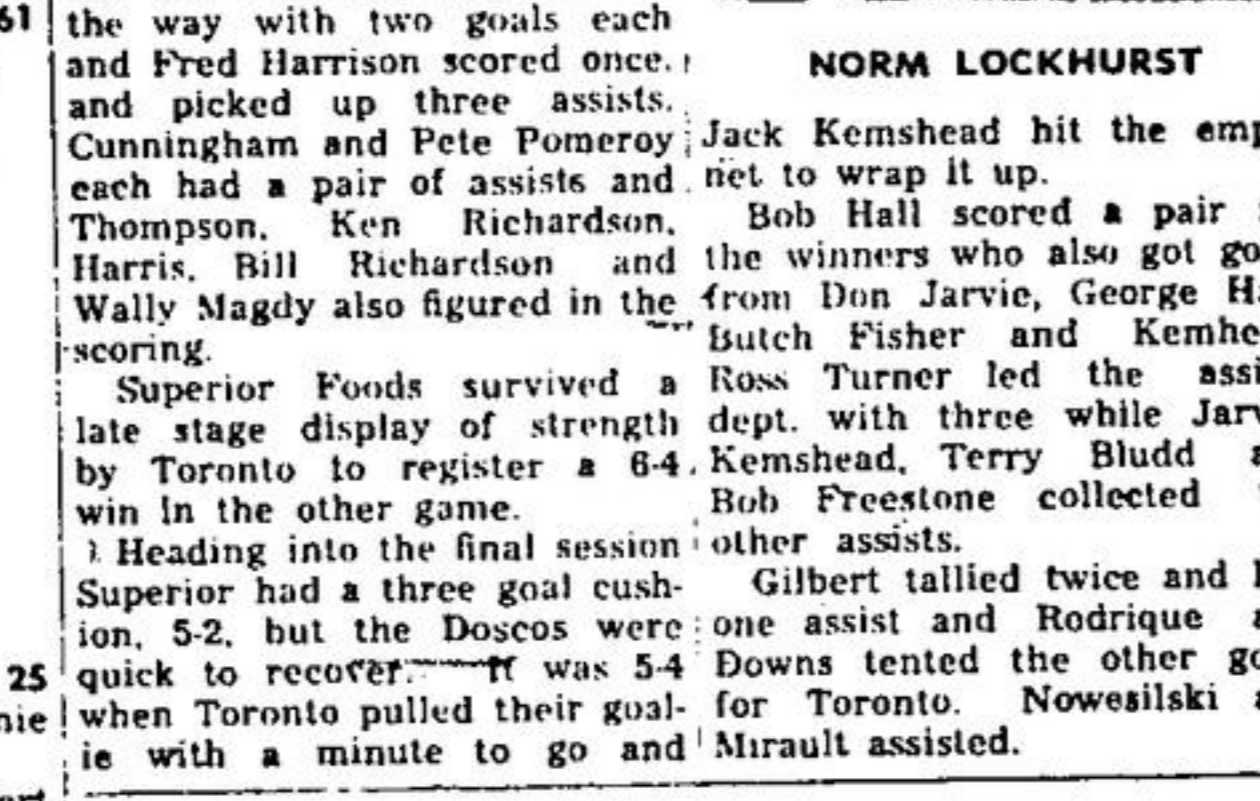
