### Two Weeks To Go License Sales Drag

Unless the figures change in a very short time, the apparent reluctance of drivers to obtain their car and truck plates before the deadline, will result in record trumps at that time.

In a condition that is apparently being repeated across the province, only a trickle of vehicle operators are obtaining licenses.

Locally, while the sales have been higher than many agencies, sales are still well below 20 per cent of plates to be obtained, and this with less than 14 actual selling days left.

Offices are extending hours in an effort to take care of the expected "last" minute flurry. Locally, the Dept. of Transport office at 41 Main Street South will be open from 9 until 5:30, every day during the week. On Saturdays it will be open continuously until 5 p.m.

All drivers are urged to try and obtain their plates just as soon as possible. Extra personnel will be in the office on the week-ends until the deadline of March 15th is reached.

### District Has Fewer Jobless

There were 244 fewer persons registered for work in this area in the first week of February than in the corresponding period last year. On Feb. 2nd, this year 2,191 were registered for work. Last year it was 2,435.

Of the people out of work at the present time 2,051 are claiming unemployment insurance benefits.

These statistics include Chinguacousy, Caledon, all of Dufferin County, part of Esqueving Township — including Georgetown — as well as Brampton.

The placements for January also exceed those for January, 1960 by 78. In January this year 180 persons were found jobs. January, 1960, the number was 102.
