The present Commanding Officer, Lt. Col. Arthur Kemp, CD, states that plans are well under way for the event which will be held in Brampton, location of the Militia unit's Regimental Headquarters. The two day affair is slated for Saturday and Sunday. May 6th and 7th, 1961. One of the largest Canadian infantry units to serve in World War II, the Lorne Scots provided more than two thousand officers and men in all theatres, with the exception of the Far East.

"The Lornies" had a total of 45 detached units in operation and provided a number of staff officers at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa and Canadian Military Headquarters in London, England, as well as at headquarters of various field formations. . 




