The trouble was discovered at about 8:30 Thursday morning when arena superintendent Don Gosling made an inspection of the plant. Smoke was pouring from the pump and the shaft was red hot when he shut it down. Rapid service would be a modest appraisal of the attention given the matter by servicing firm in Kitchener. The pump was taken out of the arena at about 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon and by 9:15 the re-conditioned pump was back ready for installation. By 11:30 the ice plant was operating again and Saturday morning Little N.H.L. Hockey went on as usual. Affected by the breakdown was Minor Hockey Thursday night, and a Georgetown Raider vs Bradford game scheduled for Friday night.

For Raiders the Ontario Intermediate A playoffs get underway Friday, March 3rd in Oakville. At a meeting of representatives in the Hunter Real Estate office Sunday, the playoff schedule for the COHL clubs was laid down after it was decided that games remaining to be played in the regular schedule would be washed out since they could decide nothing. Raiders were scheduled to play Bradford here last Friday but when the ice plant failed the contest had to be cancelled. The club negotiated for Tuesday night but the Minor Hockey organization were firm about not giving up their night. Also chopped-off by the ruling was a game to be played with Dundas here Friday. Officially the Raiders wound up in third position in the A standings, behind Barrie and Oakville and ahead of Milton and Dundas. Dundas as the fifth team is out of further competition. Georgetown's first home game of the playoffs will be Saturday, March 4th. The Raiders were partnered off with the Oaks when Barrie chose Milton Merchants as the team least likely to succeed and an ideal opponent in the first round. Barrie was entitled to the choice of the field by virtue of their first place finish and automatic ownership of the Tim O'Neil trophy symbolic of COHL supremacy. Milton tried to squirm out of the dubious honour by claiming that Barrie had no right to the choice since nothing to that effect had been recorded in the minutes at the start of the season. They, of course, were wrong. The motion was made by Raider proxy Fred Maveal seconded by a Barrie representative and carried by all present, including Milton. The rest of the Raiders best of seven series with the Oakville Oaks is scheduled this way: Tues. March 7th — In Oakville. (3rd game) Fri. March 10th — In Georgetown (4th game) Wed.
