**Town, Delrex to Confer
Seek Land Release Again**

A letter from Delrex Development, Ltd., read at Monday's council meeting, asked for an 'informal, fact-finding conference' between council and company officials to discuss releasing building land over a three year period.

Council debated the merits of a 'committee of the whole' meeting or an open council meeting before deciding on the former in a straw vote which found a 5-3 majority favouring the conference.

"It's some time since we've met and I don't favour a public meeting which would merely give a chance for propaganda bars," said Cr. Ian Cass, who said any meeting should be informal with an emphasis on facts.

While seeming to favour an open council meeting, Finance Chairman John Elliott said he wanted a meeting.
