

Oaks, Raiders are Tied In OHA Playoff Series

Voyce Sidelined For Rest of Year

The largest Oakville crowd of the season saw their team take a 2-0 first period lead and then maintain it as the Oaks bumped Georgetown. Raiders 5-2 in the lake town Friday to go one up in their best of seven OHA playoff series.

The game's turbulent point came after the second period buzzer. Dave Voyce who earlier had received a minor plus a ten minute period misconduct started to badger Hodgins as the team left the ice. The official waved the blond rearguard to the dressing room but Voyce persisted and finally crosschecked Hodgins in a fit of temper. He didn't return for the third period and won't be able to for exactly one year.

Don Hunter, who played an outstanding game on the Raider defense juggled the puck most of the way on Georgetown's second tally. He flipped to Dunn who relayed to Blake Inglis and Miller moved late on the shot. The fifth Oakville marker took the steam out of any Raider rally hopes. Hall got it after taking a pass from Maxwell just past the fifteen minute mark.

Raiders Come Back To Even Playoffs

The clubs collided in the second game of their best of seven series here Saturday night and when it was all over officials Boschier and Hamilton made a written request of their referees that only top notch referees be assigned to handle future Oak Raider tilts.

Georgetown, who dished out the best of the bumping in this one, penned the hustling Oaks inside their own blue line for the major part of the sixty minutes, and evened the series at one game apiece with a convincing 3-1 decision.

Hardnosed defenseman Al Hume of the meat transport Home's and James Cunningham who missed the opener in Oak town were dressed for this one and their presence was the necessary boost Raiders needed to contain Ford and Company.

Murray Armstrong drew two fighting majors and teetered on the brink of a game misconduct. Hume was his pugilistic partner in the second and Blake Inglis sparred with him momentarily in the first. A third major would have meant an automatic game banishment.

Oak coach Bud Corbett had some wordy sword play with a ref in the second period and watched the third from seats after being waxed off the bench.

Oakville was playing five men to Raiders' six when Junior Beaumont banged in the first goal at 10:47 of the first period from Frazer Dunn. Dunn also set up the second counter. Blake Inglis beat Miller at 15:32 to finish the play and the first period scoring.

Flashy Wally Maxwell was the only Oak to dent All Pro's armour. That was a 1-25 of the middle period with Georgetown playing a man short. Hall and Ford picked up assists on the thrust.

Hume and Cunningham combined, on the insurance tally midway through the game, and Raiders pressed for a wider margin but succeeded only in stalling up the Oak attack.

In the scorching third Georgetown owned such an edge that usually threatening Oaks managed only three scoring chances.
