Captain Betty Quackenbush called time out and on return to play the Georgetown girls settled down to business and were leading 9 to 8 at the end of the first quarter. From then on it was Georgetown all the way as they led 24 to 11 at the half, 34 to 13 at the three quarter mark and 46 to 16 at the final whistle and 96 to 23 on the road.

Betty Quackenbush again led her team in points scored with 25, Leslie Quackenbush followed with 14 and Diane Pennock hit for 7. Carroll Farnell brought on to the guard line because of injuries to Janet Murray turned in a first class effort while the regular guard played their usual steady game keeping the opposing forwards well under control.

This win earned for the Georgetown girls the right to play in the C.W.O.S.S.A. "B" Basketball Tournament which is held at the O.A.C., Guelph. Both Junior and Senior teams from Georgetown High will play in this tournament as the Senior team were conceded the right by District 7.

And to sportsmen (trout fishermen, especially) this could have been a telling blow, that could effect the trout fishing around Glen Williams, Terra Cotta and Georgetown this spring. But in talking to Clare Wilson the other night about this problem, Clare, assured yours truly that the big ones will still be there come spring, and the ones I keep catching will still be there also.

As Clare put it, "Mother Nature may bring on these storms, but Mother Nature provides for, and takes care of her own also."

One thing that worried me, was how the blasting would affect the fish in the vicinity, but my mind was set at ease when told that in most cases, a fish is only stunned by such a blast and will revive in a very short time.

My wife was glad to hear about this, as she was getting tired of running over to hold my hand every time I thought about it.

Have you ever said to yourself, "Where will we go today or this weekend? This won't have to happen this summer as the Hon. Wilfred Spooner, announced last week that nine new Provincial Parks will be opened this summer to go with the 90 parks in operation last year.

This number does not include parks run by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority and parks such as Fairy Lake park or Waterfalls Playground.

People who live in towns like Georgetown, Acton, etc. may sometimes wish they lived in the big city where they have streets like Yonge St. in Toronto near by. But most of these people would say goodbye to the city forever if some night this summer night after supper they hopped into the car and visited such parks as the Terra Cotta Conservation Park and do some swimming, fishing, or just lying around.

My wife and I and son Jeff did this quite often last summer and boy those freshly caught speckled trout are just the thing for a midnight snack.

Don't wait for the weekend, and you'll miss all the crowds as more than 5,500,000 people visited these 90 parks last summer alone.

Dunc registered 10 straight hits last week and he did it the hard way, in the doubles. This is where two trap birds are released at once.

Fred Howse, trap chairman on the next weekend hit the first 18 straight out of a shoot of 25 birds.

The Club has a good assortment of gauges on hand now and invites anyone interested in trap shooting to come up on Sunday between 10.30 a.m. and 3.00 p.m.

If you just want to go up and try it, there are usually extra shotguns on hand.
