

## Asks Larger Grant For 1961 Halton Sightless

With fingers flying over the Braille report from the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Mr. W. Stanley held County Council unusually still, while he outlined the year's activities in Halton.

Sixty-four sightless persons were provided with services in Halton, eight of them in Georgetown, Mr. Stanley stated. Six of the total are pre-school children. It was noticeable that the word blind was not used by Mr. Stanley. He described the training given, such as typing, braille, and handicrafts, and most important of all, social adjustment. He told of the library of braille books, and magazines, and the talking books, which are full length books on record. Mr. Stanley informed Council that the cost of these services was \$11,000 last year, resulting in a deficit of \$2,000.

He asked consideration be given to an increase in the grant. Warden Phillips promised the utmost consideration would be given.

### Boosts County Industry

The formation of a Halton County Industrial Committee was advocated by R. J. Cooksley, Director of Industrial Development for Trafalgar, in a letter to County Council.

The Committee would consist of the industrial spokesmen for each town or Township in the County. The information about his own municipality would be gathered by that area's representative.

A complete County-wide brochure would then be printed most economically, by eliminating all photographs and expensive art work.

The members felt it would be an advantage to have a central committee such as this, and will take measures to implement the idea.

An assistant to County Clerk Garfield Brown has been appointed. Mr. James C. Andrews of Oakville was selected to fill this newly created position. Thirty one applications were received.

Assessment in Halton County rose 8.1% in 1960, County Assessor Ford Rogers disclosed. This was the same increase as the previous year. In dollars the assessment stands at 218 millions. The population rose by 6.2% to 111,867.

### Would Standardize Firefighting Rules

Furthering their aim to standardize firefighting procedures in Halton and throughout Canada, Halton County Mutual Fire Services organization last week held discussions on brigade colours and hand signals.

It was suggested that each Halton brigade could mark their hose coupling and equipment with a different color of paint, to aid the men in proper identification of equipment following fires where more than one brigade responds. The idea was adopted and brigades will soon be issued with their respective colors.

The firemen attending the meeting in Acton also received printed cards listing hand signals to be used in firefighting. It is hoped the idea, which has been in use in Halton for some years, will be distributed to other brigades across Canada by the Fire Marshal's office, thus standardizing procedures in all brigades.

The organization endorsed a plan of the Fire Prevention Bureau, a subsidiary of Mutual Aid, to include within its membership interested individuals as well as Halton firemen. From the time the fire prevention group was formed in 1957 until the present, only firemen held memberships.

George Alexander of the Fire Marshal's office spoke to the gathering on compensation and various other matters. Plans were made for the annual banquet in April in Milton.
