### Seek Equalizer Friday When Oaks Play Here

By some time around 10:30 this Friday night Georgetown Raiders will be either on even terms or on the brink of elimination in their best of seven OHA Intermediate A series with the Oakville Oaks. Oakville took a two to one lead in games Tuesday night in Oakville when they broke a tight game wide open in the third period with five goals to double up the locals 8-4 in a game that appeared to belong to Raiders right from the start. Georgetown monopolized the play in every period and outshone their opposition by a wide margin but most of the pucks wound up in the gloved hand of Oak netter John Miller. The ones that did get by Miller were either on the ice or on his stick side, but Georgetown snipers insisted on peppering his strong side. At the other end of the ice Al Troita did not get the same co-operation from Oakville marksmen. A former resident of Georgetown, Norman Wallace Burns, Rockwood, died in Hamilton on Thursday, February 23rd, 1961. He was in his 69th year. Mr. Burns was born in Everton, the son of Kate Ferguson Burns and Alex Burns. On June 9th, 1925, he and Olga Moore were married, she predeceased him some years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Burns moved to Georgetown in 1929 where he held a short time as the executive for the Canadian National Railway and in 1931 he started his own trucking business with one truck. The business now consists of several modern tractor trailer trucks which their four surviving sons Robert, James, Clare and Donald, carry on. Mr. Burns was a member of the Church and during his years in Georgetown, was a faithful worker in St. John's where he served as an Elder and for many years was superintendent of the Sunday School. At the time of his second marriage to Marion McCullough who survives him, he moved to Rockwood. Surviving also are two brothers and two sisters, Mrs. T. L. Hall, Mrs. J. Thompson of Guelph, Melvin Burns of Acton and Alexander Burns of Victoria, B.C. Ten grandchildren are also left. Rev. Byron Howlett of Guelph and Everton conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, Georgetown on Saturday, February 25th at two o'clock. ### Defeat Guelph, Delhi Bring Honour to Town

In a thrill-packed game that went into overtime to decide the winners, Georgetown District High School Junior Girls' Basketball team defeated last year's Champions, Guelph Notre Dame, 30 to 26 in the semi-final of the CWOSSA 'B' basketball tournament held at OAC, Guelph. This proved to be the crucial game for Georgetown as they took Delhi Junior girls into camp with comparative ease in the final match by 42 to 23 to win the first CWOSSA 'B' Junior Girls Basketball Championship to come to Georgetown High. Delhi had earned their spot in the final round by defeating Walkerton Juniors in the other semi final. The final game was an anticlimax to the nip and tuck battle of the first match. Notre Dame opened the scoring and held an 8 to 6 lead at the first quarter. Each team scored 7 in the second quarter leaving Notre Dame with a two point lead at the half. The close checking by the guard line of both teams held the forwards down in the third quarter as Georgetown evened the count scoring 3 to 1 for Notre Dame. With the score up at the three quarter mark, both teams went all out. The lead see-sawed back and forth, basket by basket with each team scoring 10 points in the last quarter and the score stood 26 even at the final whistle. The Georgetown girls played almost perfect ball in the two minutes overtime. Coolly playing controlled ball the local team outmanoeuvred the opposition with Betty Quackenbush making the breakaway and on receiving a rifled pass from sister Leslie went in for a perfect lay-up shot. Receiving the ball, Notre Dame played it down the floor only to meet a solid defence. Georgetown stole the ball and again calmly played for the break and on the play by Di Pennock and Les Quackenbush, Betty again went in for another two points.
