**Sign Request Leads to Procedural Squabble**

**Committee Chairman Claims He's By-Passed**

Permission to erect an advertising sign at his speedwash building on the highway was granted to Cr. Don Barrager by council Monday.

But only after an involved discussion which found Cr. Ian Cass violently objecting that he was by-passed as chairman of the planning committee. The councillor received some support in his stand from Reeve Sargent and Crs. Brown and Burke, but when it came to a recorded vote only the reeve voted with Cass against the permit.

The fact that the sign would be approved, even by Cr. Cass, seemed to be a foregone conclusion. But he was annoyed that an Elliott - Hunter motion was made without prior consultation with him as committee chairman.

"No official written request has been submitted either to council or the planning committee. I don't know the size or shape of the sign, where it will be hung or whether the zoning by-law allows it," he charged.

He admitted that it had been discussed at a planning meeting on a verbal request by Cr. Barrager, but insisted that formalty should be adhered to. "In other words, this is a personal matter," remarked Cr. Barrager, whose Main St. sign was taken down after a lengthy battle last fall.

At this stage the sign took second place to a procedure discussion.

Reeve Sargent suggested the motion be held a week to soothe ruffled feelings. Cr. Hunter suggested that the motion be had seconded be withdrawn so Cr. Barrager could submit a written request. Deputy Reeve Elliott declined to withdraw.

"The chairman wasn't by-passed." Last week we had motions from the planning committee which he wouldn't move and this is the same," he said.

"I feel like the reeve. I wouldn't like to see this procedure on my committee," opined Cr. Burke.

Cr. Brown said he was disturbed by the inference that the chairman of a committee could be by-passed.

"I did my best this year to not get this committee, but now that I have it I'll do the best I can with it," said Cr. Cass, as he reiterated his annoyance.

At this point the deputy reeve suddenly decided to withdraw the motion.

A few minutes later it was presented again after written request had been read from Cr. Barrager. Some of the discussion was rehearsed and when a recorded vote was called, it carried 6-2. (Cr. Barrager did not vote on the motion.)
