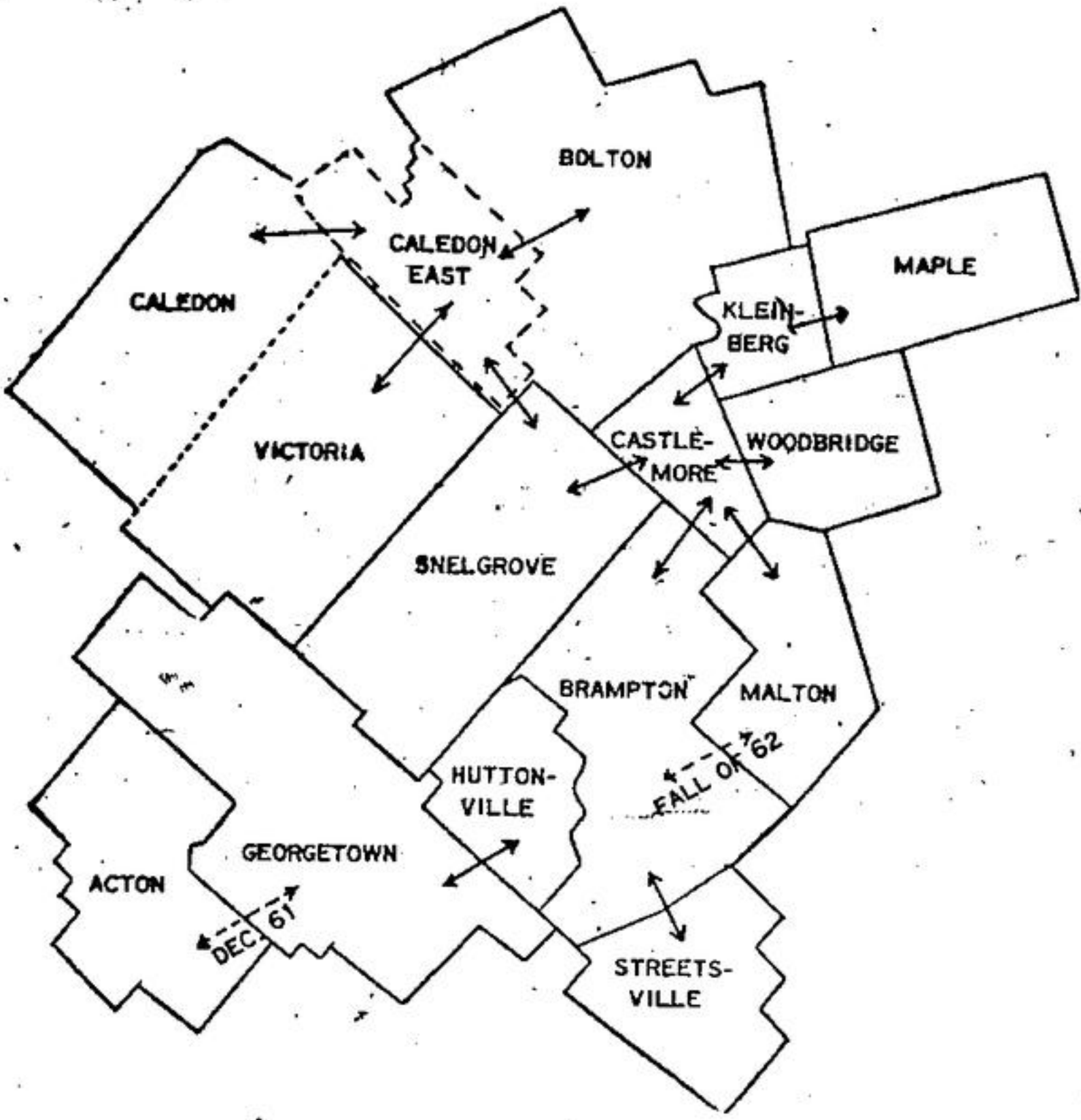


# Free Phone Calls Coming To Huttonville and Acton



Georgetown telephone customers will be able to call free of long-distance charges all Huttonville and Acton customers. It was announced this week by Lloyd Denby, local manager of the Bell Telephone company.

He said the extension between Georgetown and Huttonville will take place in September, with Acton to be added in December.

Mr. Denby added, "The widening of Georgetown's local calling area is part of a company-wide plan to meet the demand for extended area service (EAS) in neighbouring exchanges having a strong community of interest between them."

He pointed out, however, that widening the Georgetown local calling area to include

these centres brings the number of toll-free telephone calls that can be reached from Georgetown into the over 5,000 group. Since rates for telephone service are determined by the number of telephones that can be reached free of long-distance charges, Georgetown's rates will be adjusted slightly to bring them in line with the new grouping.

## Chapel School Students Give Variety Entertainment

### Excellent Program of Music, Halton Manor

The sweet strains of children's singing filled the auditorium on Tuesday night, February 28th, when fifty pupils of Chapel Street Public School in Georgetown came to the Manor to present a program. Their principal, Mr. Val Stein came with them and acted as chairman for the evening. The various numbers on the program were given under the supervision of Mr. Ken Harrison, ARCT, music director of the Georgetown Public Schools. The parents of several of the pupils were very welcome visitors also.

An appropriate prayer by Rev. Ian Fleming, minister of St. John's United Church in Georgetown opened the program. The choir of fifty pupils then presented the first group of choral numbers, with Mrs. James Evans at the piano as accompanist. This first group consisted of 'Skip to My Lou', 'Daisy', and 'Home on the Range'. Later on in the program, the choir sang 'The Battle Hymn of the Republic' and 'All Through the Night'. To close the program the pupils sang 'When Irish Eyes are Smiling' and a Mexican song, 'Chiquititas'. In the Mexican song they clapped hands to give a very fine rhythmic effect. All these choral numbers were very well done and delighted the audience. A number of vocal and instrumental solos and duets also afforded the audience great pleasure. Gillian Swann sang, 'The Little Princess' and Miss Virginia Walker, a teacher on the staff of Chapel Street School played a bagpipe solo, 'The Road to the Isles', for which she wore a very attractive Scottish costume. Christine Scott played a piano solo, 'Two Little Frogs' and Barbara Evans who had been 'borrowed' from the Georgetown High School sang, 'Out of My Dreams'. Mrs. Evans and Mr. Harrison played a piano duet, 'The Blue Tango' and Mr. and Mrs. Fleming sang two hymns, 'Blessed Assurance' and 'More About Jesus'. Lucian Tomazik played an accordion solo, 'Carnival of Venice', and this was followed by several little novelty numbers by a group of four boys, Dennis, Neil, Wayne and Peter, who call themselves 'The Chipmunks'. Miss Sandra Sproule sang two solos 'Sound of Music' and 'Climb Every Mountain' and Miss Walker played a second bagpipe solo, 'Daisy'. Two vocal solos, 'Over the Rainbow' and 'The Road to the Isles' were sung by David Farnell, who had been 'borrowed' from Wriglesworth School. The last number on the program, a vocal duet, 'The Lord's My Shepherd' was sung by Barbara Evans and David Farnell. Mr. Harrison was the accompanist for the vocal solos and duets. Every number on the program was heartily enjoyed by the audience and when cold drinks and cookies were served at the close of the program, it was a pleasure for the residents to meet these talented performers, Mr. Stein,

Mr. Harrison, Mrs. Evans and the parents during a very pleasant social hour. This was the fourth occasion on which the residents have been entertained by Chapel Street pupils and it is hoped that they will come again soon.

This very enjoyable evening of vocal and instrumental music was followed by another delightful evening on Wednesday, March 1st, when an eagerly anticipated program was presented by fifty ladies, gentlemen and children who belong to the Acton Scottish Dance Club. This club includes ladies, gentlemen and children from Milton, Guelph, Clarkson and Campbellville. Mr. and Mrs. Izatt were the directors of the dancing for the evening and Mr. W. Foyers was the genial master of ceremonies. It was greatly regretted that the president of the club, Dr. Robert Buchner, of Acton, and Mrs. Buchner were not able to come. The entire group of dancers looked very attractive, the children being dressed in full dress Scottish costumes, the ladies in white dresses and tartan scarves and the gentlemen in white shirts and kilts. To the strains of the bagpipes the entire group of visitors opened the program by marching around the auditorium.

The residents sat in a large circle, leaving the centre of the floor open for the dancers. The dances were performed to the music of a record player. A great number of dances were performed, some by the children alone, some by the adults alone and some by the adults and children together. Thirteen children won the hearts of the audience completely by dancing the Highland Fling, 'The Sword Dance' and the Shean Trubhais. Although some of the children were as young as five years of age, they performed like experts. Later in the program, eight of these same children danced the Broad Sword Dance. The adults danced such lively dances as 'The Dashing White Sergeant', 'The Country Dance Waltz', and 'The Bright and Airy'. Mr. Dan Hunter of the Manor's own staff danced a lively step dance at the close of the program. Other numbers on the program also afforded great pleasure to the audience. These were two lovely little vocal solos, 'Tulips in Heather' and 'I See the Moon', sung by Donna Rennie, and a little poem 'Kindness' recited with very fine expression by Margaret Gurtis. Mrs. George Robertson was the accompanist for Donna.

This fine program of lively dances, vocal solos and a recitation was followed by a pleasant social hour in which typical Scottish delicacies such as scones and shortbread, along with sandwiches and cookies, were served as tea, as a delicious lunch.

Several motion picture films were shown during the week of February 26th On Wednesday afternoon, March 1st, Mr. Allen showed four short subjects and on Friday night, March 3rd, he showed the full-length film,

which was in beautiful colour and which was shown with the Cinemascope lens, depicted the establishment of Spanish settlements and Missions in Southern California by a band of priests and soldiers from Mexico in 1769.
