FARM NEWS

Middlesex Farmer to Speak at Seed Display

A Middlesex farmer, Mr. Gordon Smale, has been invited by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association to address this year's Hay Show and Seed Display Day.

The Directors of the Association selected Mr. Smale, of Mossley, Ont., because of management practices carried out on their farms. J. H. Smale & Sons are noted for modern methods of forage handling.

All phases of farm operation will be discussed, and in particular the changes made in the farm operations as a result of time and motion studies. The Annual Hay Show and Seed Display is set for Thursday, March 16th, in the Agricultural Hall at the Milton Fair Grounds.

This year's Hay Show will have classes for four types of hay. The programme is part of the forage promotional work being carried on by the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association. Good quality hay is the first step in cutting costs in livestock production. On display at the show will be samples of hay, with nutritional analyses, to show the different effects of handling.

Judging of the Hay classes will take place in the morning. In the afternoon the programme will start with an identification of Weeds and Forage Plants and seeds. This will give an opportunity to those attending to compare for prizes and refresh their knowledge of weeds and forage plants.

CARS COLLIDE ON SLIPPERY PAVEMENT

Cars driven by Merv Cook of 5 Normandy Blvd. and Ed Francis, 14 Temple Road collided on the slippery pavement Thursday, resulting in close to \$300 damage.

According to a police report, both cars were east bound on Guelph Street. The Cook car, a 1956 Dodge, was slowing to make a right turn onto Normandy when struck from behind by the skidding 59 Chev driven by Mr. Francis. The accident occurred following a severe blizzard and driving conditions were poor.

St. R. D. Whitson who made the investigation placed the damage at \$75 to the Cook car and \$200 to the Francis car. The collision was reported at about 8:30 p.m.

Enthusiastic Meeting for Young Liberal Inaugural

One hundred young people were present at the Gold Room of the Royal Oak Hotel, Oakville, last Friday evening when they organized Halton Young Liberal Association.

The new association will be affiliated with the Ontario Young Liberal Association and the Senior Halton County Liberal Association.

The Young Liberals of Halton County will spearhead a drive to seek out a Liberal candidate to run in the next Federal election. A resolution to this effect was unanimously passed by members attending the organizational meeting.

Veteran Liberal party members said the meeting marked the strongest Liberal showing in this country in years. The resolution expresses the group's foremost task. The actual selection of the candidate will be done in conjunction with the Halton County Liberal Association, with which the Young Liberals are affiliated.

A constitution had been drawn up earlier by a group of interested young people (and should be elected to the meeting) by Jim Clifford and received ratification. It sets out the aims of the association, which will be a political and social club, open to all young people of Halton County between the ages of 18 and 35. Owen Mullin of Burlington chaired the meeting until the officers were appointed, and gave a brief history of Liberalism and its leadership from the days of William Lyon Mackenzie until the present time.

Elections were necessary for all offices when enthusiastic young people for the Liberal cause made their addresses giving qualifications why they should be elected. The ballotting resulted as follows: President, Bob Blake; executive vice president, Jim Clifford; 1st vice president, Alex Huggill; secretary, Miss Sally Davis; treasurer, Mr. Laverne.

Challenging Talk Peter Papillon, president of the Senior Halton County Liberal Association, was present and gave a very challenging talk to the young Liberals, citing the accomplishments of the Liberal party in the past, and urging them to get out and work for a party that is neither on the left or the right, but a party of reform that can steer a course for good government in this province and this country.

He deplored the unemployment in this country today and what was being done about it, and said the same situation existed between 1930 and 1935 when the Conservatives were in power, and did not change until the Liberal party again took office in 1935. He said that today only the legislation put in by the Liberal party was saving many more thousands from being unemployed.

Guest speaker of the evening was David Greenspan, a graduate of Toronto University and president of the Ontario Y. L. A. An outstanding speaker not only for his ready wit, but for his sincerity of purpose, he criticized his own party for what they had not done, and said that younger men are ready and willing to take over and lead the party back to its rightful place. He cited many cases where men in their early thirties and forties were making themselves felt, including the new premier of New Brunswick at 31 and the premier of Quebec in his early forties.

The newly formed association have already plans covering activities in Halton for the entire year. Programs were distributed listing such events as an evening with John Wintermyer, another with Judy LaMarsh, public speaking and debating, dances, golf, etc. etc.

WILL JOIN SCHOOL AREA

It was reliably learned this week that trustees and residents of the Ligny, Quatre Bras and Hornby school areas have agreed to seek inclusion in Esquimes' School Area No. 1.

For years these southern township schools have operated as separate units away from the township board, and have been managed by local boards of trustees. However, the boards have petitioned the Area Board to be included in the township section, and it is understood that a new consolidated school is to be erected in the southern portion of the township, to serve pupils from the three schools. No site has been chosen but the trustees are planning a location on or near 5 Sideroad.

At Ligny, school enrolment jumped to 45 this year and 10 pupils have to be transported to nearby Milton Heights school. It is understood Hornby and Quatre Bras schools are also overcrowded.

Township council and the area board have reportedly okayed the plan.
