**Bahai Speaker Tells Of Life in Alaska**

The word "Eskimo" conjures up a picture, usually a shapeless bulge of furs in a frozen waste, with an igloo in the background. What a surprise to meet a charming, attractive, chiefly dressed woman with the mundane name of Mrs. Agnes Harrison, and realize she is the Eskimo lady you came to meet. Mrs. Harrison was in town last week on a cross-Canada Bahai speaking tour.  
Mrs. Harrison was born in Crooked Creek, Alaska, where she lived until she was 10. She spent the winter time. Surprisingly enough, neither is a temperature of 90 above in the summertime.  
The igloo, in this part of Alaska, turns out to be an oil heated apartment with all the conveniences, plus high rents \$100 a month would be the minimum according to Mrs. Harrison, and \$225 for a furnished apartment, would not be considered rare.  
This Bahai speaker is a real North American. She is of mixed heritage, part Eskimo, Indian, French Canadian, and American, who is married to an American of English descent.

barren desert. Irrigation had only reached one side. They returned to the north flying directly over the North Pole. In 1960 she met ex-President Eisenhower, while attending the White House conference on Children and Youth, as a representative of native peoples.  
Mrs. Harrison feels that Eskimos and Indians are particularly receptive to the message of Bahais, since they retain their feeling for one God, the return of the Great White Spirit.  
The Bahai faith teaches the unity of God, and the unity and equality of all mankind. It bars discrimination and prejudice, and declares divine revelation to be progressive, not final. Bahais accept the teachings of eight religions regarded as the forerunners of their founder, Baha'ullah.  
The eight are Zoroastrian, Sabean, Hebrew, Christian, Islamic, Buddhist, Hindu, and religion of Bab the immediate predecessor of Baha'ullah.

Mr. Wallace Harrison of Tennessee.  
After graduation from high school in Anchorage, Mrs. Harrison attended Western Washington College of Education, in Bellingham, Washington, which is not too far from Seattle.  
On graduating from teacher's college, she and her husband returned to the north to teach. She opened schools where no school had ever been. With her ability to speak four Eskimo dialects, she frequently serves as an interpreter in the courts. In fact, there are very few positions she hasn't occupied. Simultaneously, she was United States Commissioner, Agent for Dept. of Public Welfare, licensing agent for Fish and Wild Life Survey, President of Bethel Health Council, Secretary of Bethel Village Council, Treasurer of Bethel Women's Club, and a substitute teacher besides.  
I wonder what her hobbies are? Possibly a lesson in public relations is being taught in the Bering Strait area, from which we might benefit. The Russians across the strait broadcast in Eskimo — no American station in Alaska broadcasts in Eskimo. If any Canadian stations do, Mrs. Harrison has not heard them. "There is much less hysteria about Russia, where they are right close at hand in Alaska," says Mrs. Harrison, "than any other part of the United States."  
Their wedding in 1949, was the first Bahai wedding in Alaska, after the recognition of the legality of Bahai weddings. The Harrison family just returned in January from a pilgrimage to Haifa, Israel, the centre of the Bahai Faith. Mrs. Harrison told of driving down a road in Israel, where one side was lush and green with vegetation, and the other side was
