

# Engage Two New Teachers For Georgetown High School Staff

## New Men Will Head Math, Science Depts.

Two new men have been engaged to join the high school staff in September. The school staff will increase by four next term, but there will be a total of five new teachers. Mrs. George Ross of Brampton, a teacher this year, is moving to Listowel where her husband will be manager of the Bank of Commerce branch. New staffers already engaged are George Register and John Bellamy. Both will be department heads. Mr. Register of the science department and Mr. Bell-

amy, mathematics. Mr. Register, a graduate of Ontario Agricultural College, comes here from Huron Park School, Woodstock, where he has been teaching science in the senior grades. Married and father of two children, he has been a member of the Woodstock Separate School Board and is interested in the work of the Retarded Children's Association which he has served as a program director. He has also coached basketball and rugby. Mr. Bellamy has his Master of Arts degree in mathematics from Cambridge University and has headed the mathematics department in Smiths Falls high school for three years. He served during the war with the Royal Signals of the British Army and was chief radio instructor at the School of Signals in Italy during the occupation. He was later principal of the training school for the London General Post Office. He has been in Canada ten years, is married and father of three children. Alan Prouse will head the guidance department in the school next term. A. B. Baxter, who is assistant principal as well as science teacher, will assume more of the administrative duties which a larger school entails.
