All Troita in the Raider net robbed Oak snipers on several chances but continued his war on coronary cases with his jumpy style. At the other end of the ice John Miller stood up to Raider triggermen like a rock but faulted on shots around his skates and his stick side.

Raiders opened their lead in the second when Beaumont scored again from Dunn and Demerse, and then set up Blake Inglis while Buchanan was sitting out a tripping penalty. Herbie Baker from Maxwell and Stephens chopped it to 4-1 before the end of the period.

Georgetown Golf Club Expands To Eighteen Holes in June

With cooperation from the weather bureau, the second nine holes at Georgetown Golf & Country Club, under construction last year, will be playable in June.

At a meeting of the club directors last Wednesday in Clarkson, the second nine was the hub of discussion. The wooded back nine will make the course one of the most challenging and scenic in this part of the province.

Presently under construction is a rustic path which will eliminate a steep wooden ramp between the 8th and 9th holes. Pre-season plans also include immediate removal of two large sheds near the clubhouse, and a driveway presently between the pro shop and the clubhouse will go in a landscaping program.

Adding eye appeal will be a new two hundred foot long bridge across a valley between the 5th and 13th holes. With all the major construction now behind them the directors are now concentrating the work crew on beautification. Club professional Jim Burton will be at the club beginning April 1st and the most ardent duffers will be on the fairways shortly after. The club's massive greens reportedly came through the winter in perfect shape.

A broomball game followed the hockey exhibition and this took place between the Halton County girls and the Peel girls.

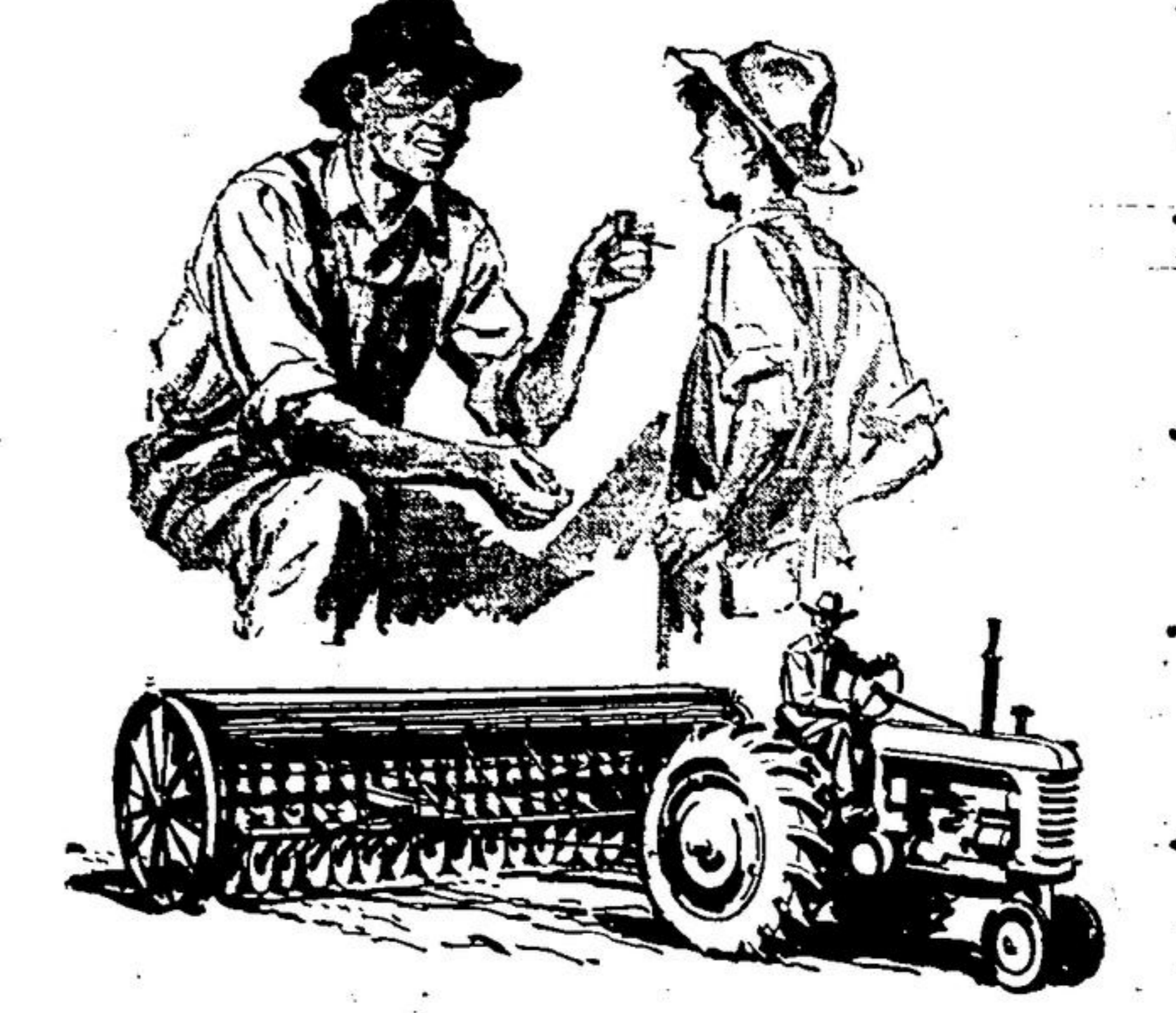
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
