Raiders Bounce Oakville In Hard-Fought Game

Win County's Harris Trophy Plus Barrie

Georgetown Raiders accomplished some hidden feats when they pushed Oakville out of the Ontario Intermediate A hockey picture with a 5-2 victory Friday night.

As well as copping the group semi final the Raiders also earned an unpublished title and made OHA officials breath a little easier.

By bouncing the Oaks, Georgetown won the Halton County Intermediate A laurels over Oakville and Milton, who lost out in their series with Barrie. As the only survivors Raiders are the logical owners of the Harris Trophy, symbolic of the county's best.

Had Oakville turned the tables on the Raiders, the O.H.A. may have had a feud on their hands. Other Intermediate A clubs in the province had reportedly been watching the progress of the Oaks with the intent to protest had they presented a serious threat for Ontario honours. Apparently bothering these other clubs was the fact that many of the Oakville players had come down from Senior A to play in Intermediate A in the same season.

Milton mildly opposed Barrie's eligibility pointing out their 25,000 plus population. Raiders trailed twice in the best of seven affair which went six games. Key win of the set

fourth Georgetown scoring play with a pass to Thompson. Doug Richardson took it from there to beat Miller from close in at the 12:20 mark.

Herbie Baker, Bob Bishop and Wally Maxwell teamed up with Baker on the scoring end while Raiders were two men short at 13:38 and the tension which faded with Raiders third and fourth goals started to build again.

Most of the crowd of 1,000 were booming out the Let's Go Raiders chant at the top of their lungs when the locals responded with the goal that took the drive out of the determined Oaks. Joe Auger has always played good hockey against the Oaks but seldom cashed in. He made good on his last attempt of the 1960-61 campaign.

Bud Vardy dropped it for Auger just inside the Oakville blueline and the ex-bomber punched it under the crossbar at 17:46 to assure the win. The final buzzer touched off a mob scene as Raiders unceremoniously celebrated their exuberance and it was fittingly Mr. Trotta, in the middle of the roughhouse congratulations.

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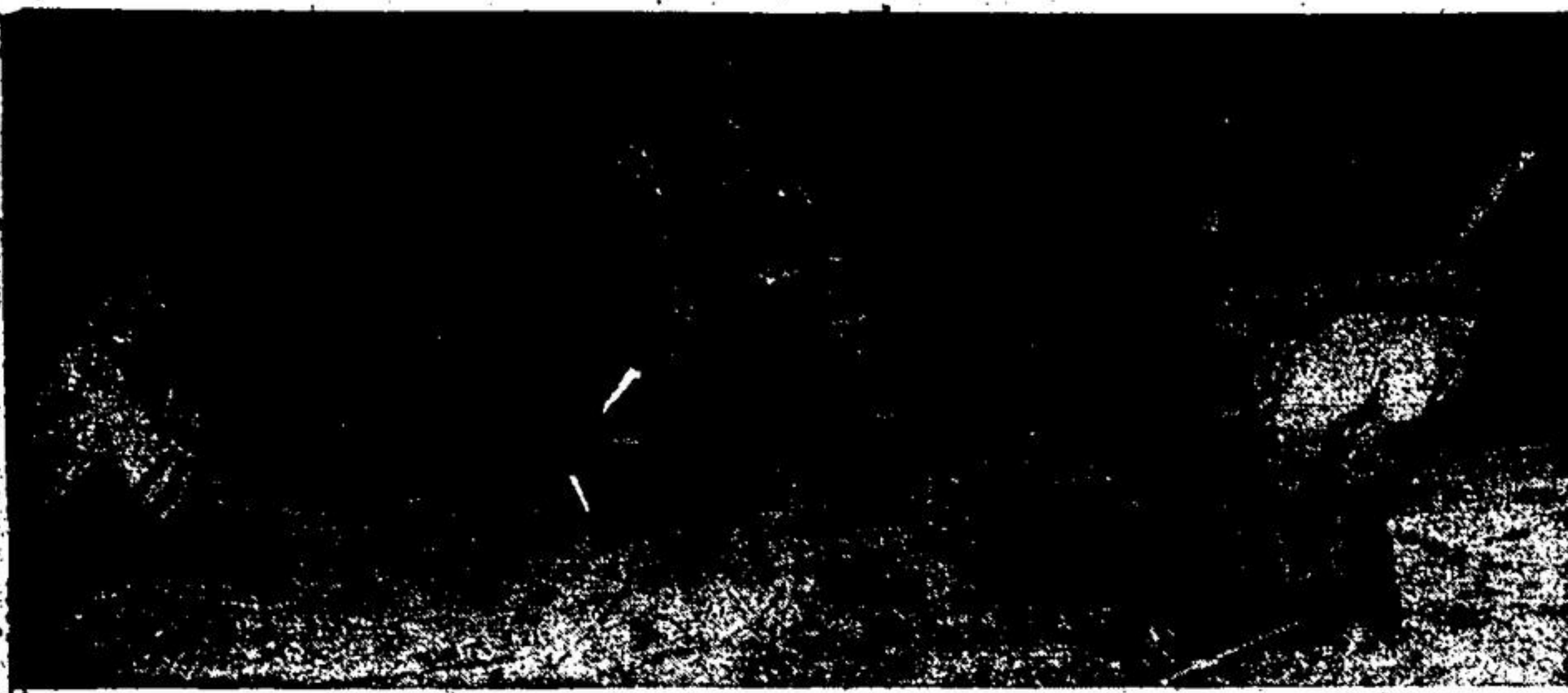

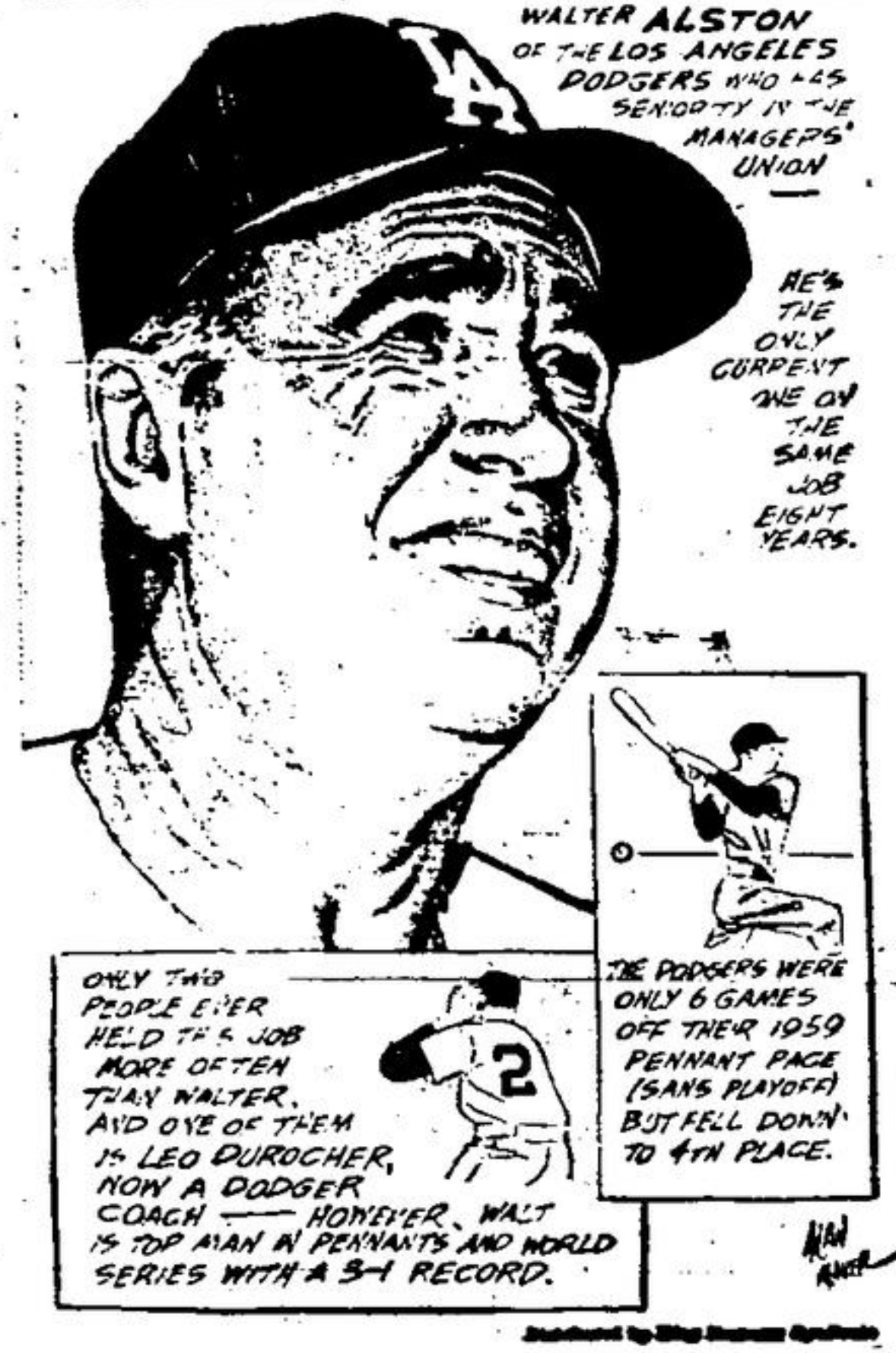

SPORTSMEN OUTDOORS

As I mentioned last week I hoped to return to the Sportsmen's Show again before it closed to see if I could get a line on any new baits, guns or equipment in general that will be on the market for Sportsmen this year.

And the things I found, are too numerous to mention them all. One thing I did find out is this. If you want to get the most out of a show, such as the Sportsmen's Show, take along a guide. In my case I had one of the best you'll find in these parts, in the person of George Hoare.

When men such as George, Mike Bolton, Pete McGillen, Elwood Epps and Scotty Anderson get together and start trading experiences, a man of my experience cannot help but gain wisdom in the art of fishing or hunting from these old pros of the game.

Two new shells on the market that won't help you kill game or catch fish, but may help you someday when you've strayed too far from camp. These are called Marine and Hunters' distress flares. These shells come in most popular cartridge sizes and gauge sizes. They produce a brilliance of 10,000 candlepower and can be seen for eight miles. The flare reaches 300 feet or more in 5 seconds, then slowly descends to about 200 feet. When reaching 100 to 150 feet the flare is completely out and harmless to forest.

For fishermen who don't usually carry shotguns or rifles when they're out fishing, there is a launching device for firing shotgun shell type flares that even children can use, if the need ever arises.

A new reel on display at the show is called the Tamco 200 spin-cast. To yours truly this reel is the answer to a bait-casting fisherman's dream.



A few features of this reel are, it will not twist the line under any conditions, can be used either left or right handed by simply switching the crank; it eliminates backlash and spool binding of line, and you can carry extra spools of different poundage tests and these spools can be changed in seconds. Your line is always in view and with this reel design you can estimate more closely the amount of line out or still on your reel.

Speaking of fishing, remember the trout season opens on the 29th of April this year unless the Dept. changes the law it passed last year. Yours truly will check again with Bob Reid on the last Thursday before April 29th and will publish again the official opening day.

Reports from the Lake Superior area, indicate fishing in this lake may be on the upswing, after the drastic blow the fishing received in this lake from the Sea Lamprey.

Reports of large catches of Herring and Bass have been received from commercial fishermen fishing this lake.

On talking to Mike Bolton the other day, I was told the transplanting of lake trout to this lake from other lakes has been taking place for some time, and it shouldn't take too long before Lake Superior again takes its place as the best producer of lake trout of the Great Lakes.

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
