Out of Work Total Drops

Forty-six fewer persons were registered for work with the Brampton employment office on March 2nd than on the same day in February.

Statistics show 2,145 persons registered on March 2 and 2,191 on Feb. 2. In February, 1960 the figures were considerably higher with 2,435 registered for work.

Last month work was found for 137, compared to 124 in February, 1960.

The Brampton office serves Chinguacousy, Caledon, Dufferin county, part of Essex Township, including Georgetown, as well as Brampton.
