Seeking out hidden diamond talent in Georgetown's 10,000 plus population is one of the three top tasks facing Georgetown's Intermediate A Baseball enthusiasts.

At a meeting Tuesday night in the arena Rose Room eleven localites working for the successful return of hardball here, listed the player hunt, a proper ball diamond, and funds as the major obstacles to be hurdled between now and opening day, May 24th.

At the meeting were Tracey Barrager, Chic Jewell, Lynn McLaren, George Barber, Jim Timleck, Scotty Patterson, Terry Harley, Dan Mossop, Don White, Nick Carter and Tom James.

Concerned over acquiring a ball field befitting intermediate calibre teams the committee formed a delegation to approach council for permission and assistance in converting one of the park's three diamonds. The group will take a look at the grounds Sunday to prepare their report.

It was the condition of the diamond that killed baseball here several years ago. Ball players can join the campaign by calling George Barber at TR. 7-4440 and anyone interested in assisting in an executive capacity can do the same. A strong working executive is another of the club's aims.

Use of bleachers being brought in for the Lions annual Rodeo will also be sought. Admissions will have to be charged at the gate if the considerable expense surrounding a senior ball club is to be met. Umpires alone will require \$15 per game. A refreshment booth was one idea suggested to defray costs.

The committee voiced their intention to co-operate with the Industrial Fastball League as much as possible and have eliminated the Industrial League's playing nights of Tuesday and Thursday from their proposed home schedule. No games will be scheduled for Sunday.

Hospital Administrator Introduced to Auxiliary

Graham Gilhooly, recently engaged as administrator for the new Georgetown & District hospital, was introduced by Mrs. William B. Hamilton to members of the hospital auxiliary at their March 14th meeting in the high school auditorium.

He told members of the progress made in hiring staff for the hospital and spoke on the part he hopes the auxiliary will play on opening day and afterwards. The building is nearing completion, he said, and should open about June 15th.

The hospital will have 66 beds, of which 20 will be for maternity and 8 pediatric. There will be in addition 22 bassinets. Complete hospital staff will be about 110 people.

A hospital, he said, has three main functions: healing, preventing sickness by X-ray and other clinics, and adding to existing general knowledge of health and health care. He had several helpful suggestions on the function of an auxiliary and said one valuable project would be raising funds for the building of a chapel.

His interesting and informative speech was followed by a question and answer period.

President Mrs. John Inglis opened the meeting with the auxiliary prayer.

As the auxiliary elections usually take place in June, which this year coincides with the proposed opening time of the hospital, Mrs. Inglis said
