Halton Liberal Leader Gets Further Honour

A rising young Liberal party worker, Bob Blake, emerged as vice president of the Southern Ontario Liberal Association following a hotly contested election at the association's annual conference held recently in Brantford. Mr. Blake had recently distinguished himself by securing the Presidency of the Young Liberals of Halton county.

Other officers elected to the association's executive were as follows: Tom Radigan, Hamilton, president; Guy Violino, Fort Erie, vice president; Mel McInnis, Hamilton, vice president; Jean Nemeth, Hamilton, secretary; and Madeline Faizy, Crystal Beach, treasurer.

Over one hundred and fifty young Liberals participated in the jam-packed program lined up for the annual conference. The formal portion of the program opened in Brantford's Hotel Kirby with an address of welcome delivered by former president of the SOYLA, Anthony Fredo. He was followed on the program by Dave Green, president of the Ontario Liberal Association, one of the better known young Liberal organizers in the province.

A stirring address by Miss Judy LaMarsh, Liberal M.P. Niagara riding, proved to be a highlight of the conference. She stressed that those in the party with youth and verve can accomplish the great things in politics today. She used her own victory in a by-election in Niagara as an example of this thesis. She, as a young woman, won the Liberal nomination from five other aspirants, and went on to take the riding. She emphasized the fact that Young Liberals today must take the initiative and become the mainstream of the Liberal party in Canada.

Miss LaMarsh participated in another of the main features of the program, a panel discussion with the following members: Elmer Sopha, Liberal member Ontario Legislature; Bruce Powe, Provincial Organizer, Ontario Liberal Association; and Jack Burnett, Campaign Manager for Miss LaMarsh. Peter Cadeau, Executive Secretary, Young Liberal Federation, acted as moderator for the group. The Young Liberals in attendance picked up a wealth of information respecting the practical aspects of how to plan and win an election. Observers felt that this session contributed many ideas which could be employed in September if a Federal Election is called. The panelists stressed the need to be prepared with the proper candidates when the election is called. The party must always be prepared to do battle in the political arena.

The guest speaker of the conference was Paul Hellyer, Liberal M.P. Toronto-Trinity. Mr. Hellyer is generally conceded to be one of the strongest Liberals in the House at the present time. He outlined the principles of the party and its attractiveness to young people. He agreed that many areas of political principles overlapped from party to party, creating an element of confusion in the public mind. However, he underlined the fact that the Liberal Party stands for the freedom of the individual. This basic principle had motivated legislation against large concentrations of power in business, in unions, in the field of communications, and even in the government itself.

Among those representing Halton County at the conference was Owen Mullin, Burlington councillor.

He remarked that Lent was the season leading up to Easter, when all eyes are fastened upon the Cross. Mr. McGowan said that God created man as a being capable of fellowship with himself but that through sin man became at enmity with God. The purpose of the Cross is Reconciliation, whereby the repentant soul is restored to God's love and grace. The Cross is the bridge between God, who is sinless and sinful creation, and this is the great purpose of the Cross.
