### OTTAWA REPORT

BIMONTHLY OBSERVATIONS BY SANDY BEST, M.P. FOR HALTON

It was a big, big meeting! Nearly 3,000 delegates and alternates registered at the Conservative Annual Meeting in Ottawa, March 16-18, but estimates of attendance ranged considerably higher. There were 40 to 50 delegates from Newfoundland, in contrast to four at the last meeting. From this area, Mr. Myrie Reid, Glen Williams, Dr. Carl Martin, Mr. David Green, Milton, and Mr. Mac Sprawl, Acton, attended as part of Halton's 15-20 man delegation. Reports varied widely as to accomplishment, excitement, and purpose. There was useful criticism, normal debate and disagreement, and much enthusiasm.

We will remember the ten below zero morning and sparkling sunshine at Uplands airport as the Prime Minister's aircraft arrived from London and the Commonwealth Conference. Hundreds of enthusiastic supporters had an opportunity to meet Mr. Diefenbaker, and in the Diplomatic Corps, men of many colours from around the world, turned out to shake hands with our Prime Minister. Later that morning, Mr. Diefenbaker spoke to a packed House of Commons with the galleries filled as I have rarely seen them before. People were seated in the aisles and lined against the walls to hear his report on return from this historic conference. It is certain that he played as an individual and as Canada's leader, perhaps the most significant role in the difficult decisions regarding South Africa I noted with interest his description of Mr. Verwoerd as a worthy burgher, and of the latter's rather degenerated document withdrawing his country's application for Commonwealth membership.
